The cruiser Boston is to be sent to Oregon.

Albany people have been startled by the size of their Newport assessments, 45 by 50 lots, with cheap cottages, are assessed as high as \$900, and the rate if up.

U. O. WON

Albany Fourth in State Contest.

The state oratorical contest at Eugene last night was won by Carlton E. Spencer, of the U. O. Carroll H. Woody, of McMinnville college was second, Miss Vena Rickard, O. A. G. third and Grover Birtchet, Albany college, fourth. Three inferior to Birtchet, three better according to the judges.

The total markings were: Spencer, U. O., 13.5; Woody, McMinnville 15; Rickard, O. A. G., 19; Birtchet, Albany, 24; Ward, P. U., 24.5; McCain, Willamette, 25; Newlin, Pacific, 37.

Birtchet was fourth both in composition and delivery, though tied with three others on the latter. One judge put him second on delivery another third and the other sixth. Woody stood highest in delivery, with 7, while Spencer, was next with 7 1/2. One judge put McCain first on delivery, another sixth, the other fourth, showing the wide range of judgment in such matters. Spencer who won was given first place on delivery by one judge, second by another and 4.5 by the other.

The judges on delivery were Rev. Hinson of Portland, R. A. Booth, Eugene, and A. C. Schmitt, Albany, while those on composition were Prof. Shurter of the U. of Texas, Prof. Trueblood of Mich., and Prof. Penrose of Whitman.

The Newport-Siletz Road.

S. G. Irvine, of Newport, was in the city this noon on his way to Portland in the interest of the proposed Siletz R. R. He reported it practically assured. The plan is to build the road by 1915. Upon the completion of the Panama canal it is expected there will be an immense demand for lumber on this coast, and it is proposed to have the magnificent body of timber up the Siletz go out by way of Newport.
