For Running a Blind Pig Nuisance.

Recorder Redfield this morning at 3 o'clock rendered his decision in the case of the City against J. D. Kennedy, charged with running a nuisance down Second street. Mr. Redfield gave a written opinion, directly to the point. He showed the evidence to be very plain that the defendant had been running a place where liquor was kept, that men frequented it, one witness said in crowds, that a good many men had been seen to leave it intoxicated, and that it was noted as a resort of drinking men. Lawyer W. S. Risley gave notice that he would appeal the case to the circuit court.
