THE PRICE OF PAVEMENT.

The city council advertises for just one kind of pavement put down by just one firm, though there is provision permitting others to put it down. If a man having a brick block to build was to advertise for bids from John Jones alone people would think he was ready for a trip to Salem. Bitulithic pavement is all right; but it costs too much for residence districts, and a city council has no right to force it upon the people so long as there are other kinds of hard surface pavements, costing much less, which men, who have investigated them, declare are as good. A city council should look out for the interests of the people of the city whom they serve. If nearly \$1,000 a block can be saved property owners it is the business of the city council to see that it is done if it does take time. They should at least investigate concrete pavement. Others who have done so declare it is a good one, that though hard it does not slip like bitulithic and that its lasting qualities are first class, concrete improving with age. Besides it is a pavement that can be mended at any time.

Pavement at the best is an expensive affair, but it is great for a city and the people will back the improvement; but they simply act in self-defense when they demand contracts at reasonable rates. There are several ordinances started now. When the bids are asked for they should call for hard surface pavement, not simply bitulithic, and property owners have a right to insist on this.
