CASCADIA

Has Biggest Bon-fire of the Season.

Cascadia, Or., Aug. 21.—The largest bon-fire of the season at Cascadia and the last big one of the year, was held Thursday night in front of the hotel. The hotel boarders who had enjoyed many fires on the camp-grounds were the hosts on this occasion and a crowd of 200 people gathered around an immense fire. The committee on arrangements, which consisted of Miss Orah Harkness, Miss Maude Laughead and Mrs. Willard Marks, sent out unique invitations written on cedar chips.

Judge P. H. D'Arcy, of Salem, who has won fame at the bon-fires as one of the leading entertainers of the camp by his able talks, songs and Shakespearean readings, presided. Rousing talks were made by Senator M. A. Miller of Lebanon, Rev. M. B. Paroungian of Brownsville, and Hon. Jefferson Myers and B. S. Pague of Portland. Excellent readings were given by Miss Orah Harkness, Miss Angel of Portland, and "Chief of Police" Ross Fletcher, and the Misses Masters of Brownsville sang splendidly.

"D'Arcy's Famous Minstrels" were then introduced and presented the crowning feature of the program. Converted into regulation minstrels by a liberal supply of burnt cork, a number of Cascadians presented a minstrel show midst constant applause, giving a program consisting of solos, chorus songs, comb music, caké walks, jigs, and the customary minstrel jokes, all of which were adapted to the people and conditions at Cascadia.

Judge D'Arcy officiated as interlocutor and Mrs. F. P. Nutting was prima donna. M. C. Reed of Portland, and Willard Marks were end men and the other members of this celebrated minstrel troupe, all of whom contributed successful "stunts" were Mrs. O. A. Archibald, Mrs. Olin Stalnaker, Mrs. David Froman and Miss Rhoda Stalnaker.
