IS THE WILLAMETTE IMPROVING?

The attention of the Democrat is called to a recent article in the Oregon, written by E. U. Will, of Portland, a former Albany business man, in which he says:
 "The writer recently made a ten mile drive in Linn county that he had not made for seven years. In all that drive he saw but one new place building up. None of the farms are being divided into smaller holdings, no new business is brought into action to build up the community and the population ahead since that time we do not get more new immigration. He also attacks the high price of farm land prevailing, and declares the reason the influx is not greater is because of over-valuation.
 The Democrat doesn't know where Mr. Will traveled his seven miles, but it must have been in the dark, or at least was not a fair criterion for him to hit his old county such a whack. People who have been all over Linn county know that there has been a decided improvement in seven years, that farms have been cut up in a good many instances, and that a prosperity prevails through the county that is emphatic.
 In the cities the improvement is very striking. Albany is a different place from seven years ago, a transformation in fact, not only in increase of population, but in internal improvements. Lebanon has gone ahead with marked strides in that time. Brownsville is having a splendid growth, and the other towns are growing.
 The price of farm lands here is said to be less than in many other places, but that is a matter that takes care of itself, governed by the law of supply and demand. Farm values are less than in the Mississippi and Missouri valleys, as shown by the recent government census reports, leaving a margin for increase.
 A good many newcomers are arriving in the valley, and it is having a healthy and permanent growth, one that is going to increase faster the coming years.
