PROCLAMATION BY THE MAYOR.

Whereas, There was submitted to the qualified legal voters of the City of Albany, Linn County, Oregon, at the regular City Election held on Monday, the 4th day of December, A. D. 1911, for their approval or rejection an amendment to the City Charter of said City as proposed by Resolution No. 33, adopted by the Common Council of said City, on the 27th day of September, 1911, which said proposed amendment is as follows:

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGAL VOTERS OF THE CITY OF ALBANY, OREGON:
THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF ALBANY DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That paragraph 2, of section 34, of chapter 4, of an Act entitled an "Act to incorporate the City of Albany, Oregon, and to provide a Charter, therefore, and to repeal all Acts and parts of Acts in conflict therewith," passed by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, at the regular session in 1901, and approved by the Governor, February 16th, 1901, as amended by subsequent Acts and parts of Acts amendatory thereof, and supplemental thereto, be and the same is hereby amended so to read as follows:

Section 34, Paragraph 2. To assess, levy and collect taxes for City purposes on all property, both real and personal, within the city limits.

Provided, that all notes, accounts and other evidences of indebtedness, belonging to, held or owned by persons residing within the city limits shall, for the purpose of taxation, be deemed personal property within the City Limits.

That the vote taken upon said amendment at said City Election held on Monday, the 4th day of December, 1911, resulted as follows:—

For said Resolution and Amendment 387
Against said Resolution and Amendment 375

Majority 12

Now THEREFORE, I, J. P. Wallace, Mayor of the City of Albany, Linn County, Oregon, do hereby proclaim, that the majority of the qualified legal voters of the City of Albany, in said County and State, have been cast in favor of said amendment as provided by Resolution No. 33. Wherefore, I do now declare and proclaim said amendment to have become a law, and is now in full force and effect as herein above set forth.

Done at the office of the Mayor of the City of Albany, Linn County, Oregon, this 3th day of December, A. D. 1911.
