A series of gauzes will show the exact condition of everything in the filter, so it will be known at a glance exactly what is needed, the amount of water in the tanks, the alum solution, and finally the clear water ready for the mains, free, not only from the solution that helped make it clear, but as well practically all microbes, destroyed in the operation.

Albany people will be given a chance to see for themselves, and an inspection will certainly give them confidence in the plant, the best it is possible to construct.
