W. R. BLAIN ON OIL MATTERS.

Editor Democrat: Yesterday a man accused me of getting a "rake-off" for keeping still about the doings of the Valley Oil Co., so I am asking space for a protest. I would like to use your whole paper so the good people could thoroughly understand the situation. I protest against the board of directors having as much power as the by-laws allow them in handling the funds of the Co. I protest against recognizing the election of the board of directors when 30 alleged proxy ballots were cast when not a proxy was recorded with the secretary and were not in any way in evidence. I protest against the spirit de corps of the Co. When the stock subscription papers were handed out, I suggested the advisability of securing the co-operation of and the subscriptions of the bankers, capitalists and solid men of wealth, so as to give the company a financial rating, and character. When some one growled back at me: "Now, we don't want such men, they are too conservative, just a step from fogysm." I protest against advertising that oil investigations are to be made in "THIS section" and getting Albany money on such pretense when the whole trend of the history of the board and their cruising show that they intend operating over in the Forks.
According to an evening paper some \$300.00 has been raised, and the same article says: "The board employed an 'oil expert'." I have too good an opinion of that board to believe that they did it. Here is the proposition: The 'esprit' has a trinket that he says infallibly locates oil deposits. He peddles out its information for a few dollars per day. Such a machine, if genuine, is well worth a million a day. Do you believe he is an expert?
I understand a big hunk of the \$300.00 raised was spent in locating oil in territory where it is geologically impossible for it to exist. I protest against spending other people's money for such foolishness. I protest against the \$2500 rake-off of stock by the organizers of the Co. I believe if the matter ever comes into court the judge will decide the deal fraudulent and the share holders would be stuck for the whole \$2500.
The paper says "the directors are highly pleased,"—that is a hot one, 40 per cent of stockholders not paying subscriptions of it. \$200 on hand to tackle a wild-cat scheme requiring at least \$25,000.00. Highly pleased!
If you are raising money to promote a distant scheme, say so. Give the people a square deal. If you are going to investigate oil possibilities within five miles of Albany, say so. Be clear and definite, so subscribers will know what they are paying for.
I protest against the whole present regime, and as the pioneer mover ask for a board of directors of well known, representative, sensible, wealthy business men who can investigate the oil, gas and artesian water possibilities within five miles of Albany in an intelligent and dependable manner.
