THE 2500

Has Its Annual Meeting, Showing Prosperity.

The 11th annual meeting of the 2500 was held last evening. The reports of officers were received, showing the 2500 to be in good condition, with a net gain of twenty members during the past year. The 2500 paid during the year for death claims \$11,364.00 with only nine deaths. It has paid since organization 11 years ago for death claims \$85,987. The 2500 does not receive members from all over the state, only people living in the following counties, and who are between the age of 18 and 45: Linn, Benton, Lane, Marion, Polk, Yamhill and Lincoln.

After considering a large petition presented from members in Benton Co. a resolution was passed, granting a special dispensation until Sept 1st 1912, to admit members for the sum of \$2.50. After Sept 1st the regular fee of \$5.00 will be charged.
Mr. Conrad Meyer was elected a director to serve for seven years. Dr. J. L. Hill was elected president, and W. M. Parker elected secretary-treasurer. The directors in their order of election and term are: W. M. Parker, Dr. J. L. Hill, D. O. Woodworth, J. J. Collins, J. W. Ellison, Neis H. Wheeler, Conrad Meyer.
