Billy Eastman says he was here recently and drank at several of the blind pigs around their chicken coops, and will give them away tonight.

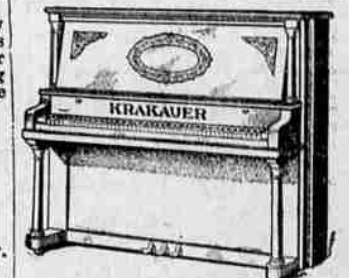
J. F. Burko, recently of New York, now in Oregon for the fight against the saloon, a lawyer by profession, and a speaker of ability.
