Gale S Hill is ahead of Winslow for district attorney about two to one in this county, and is said to have run ahead in Marion coun-ty. He is nominated by quite a margin. For representatives the republicans have nominated Chas Childs, L. G. Lewelling and F. H. Porter, and the democrats C. L. Shaw, J. M. Philpot and J. P. Cooley. D. B. McKnight is nominated for

D. B. McKnight is nominated for judge by the republicans and H. M. Palmer by the democrats.

Selling received 853 to Bourne's 310

in all but rine precincts. G. S. Hill for district attorney re-ceived 1038 to 546 for Winslow in all but five precincts.

D. S. Smith has been nominated for sheriff by the democrats, with Ed. Schoel second and F. H. Pfeiffer third. The republicans have nominated D. H. Bodine, with R. L. White second and Ala B. Marshall and A. C. Foster fol-lowing.
