The Albany high school baseball team yesterday afternoon defeated Corvallis high in a close and exciting contest 4 to 1, showing good material on both sides. Albany made three runs in the first inning, while Corvallis made none. Lyle Preece, pitcher of 26 Corvallis men, and Farmer struck out 8 Albany men. Albany made 6 hits, Ryalls leading with 2, and French, C. and L. Bigbee and McCauley each one. In the fifth inning Carson Bigbee and Ryalls made home runs in succession. Errors were credited Albany and 5 Corvallis. Carter Lee, of the Athletics, officiated as umpire.

Pioneer Picnic.

Times:—The twenty-fourth annual reunion and three days picnic of the Linn County Pioneers' Association will be held in Brownsville on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, June 19, 20 and 21, 1912. THE ELECTION.

The returns so far received indicate that in the presidential race in Oregon, Roosevelt leads Taft by several thousand; that Bourne has been beaten by selling by 4,000 to 5,000; that Gantenbein has beaten Lafferty for congress and that it is close between O'Connell and Fields for secretary of state. Hawley is of course nominated for congressman. For state food commissioner it is close. Wilson leads for president on the democratic ticket. Dr. Harry Lane is undoubtedly nominated for U. S. Senator.

In this county Roosevelt leads Taft nearly three to one, La Follette has received a fine vote. Selling is far ahead of Bourne for senator. Gale S. Hill is ahead of Winslow for district attorney about two to one in this county, and is said to have run ahead in Marion county. He is nominated by quite a margin.

For representatives the republicans have nominated Chas Childs, L. G. Lewelling and F. H. Porter, and the democrats C. L. Shaw, J. M. Philpot and J. P. Cooley. D. B. McKnight is nominated for judge by the republicans and H. M. Palmer by the democrats.

Selling received 853 to Bourne's 310 in all but nine precincts. G. S. Hill for district attorney received 1038 to 546 for Winslow in all but five precincts.

D. S. Smith has been nominated for sheriff by the democrats, with Ed. School second and F. H. Pfeiffer third. The republicans have nominated D. H. Bodine, with R. L. White second and Ala B. Marshall and A. C. Foster following.

With eight precincts not reported D. S. Smith is ahead of Ed School approximately 100 for sheriff, with Pfeiffer about 40 behind School.

With four precincts to hear from Bodine has 617, White 489, Foster 320 and Marshall 1297.

For Sheriff on the republican ticket the vote in the three Albanites, Price and Knox Butte, was Bodine 214, Foster 63, Marshall 101, White 173.

W. L. Marks is nominated for clerk by both the republicans and democrats, and E. L. Fisher for assessor by both. Grant Froman is nominated for recorder by a small vote over M. F. Wood.

With three precincts not reported Froman is ahead of Wood for recorder about 50, which will probably not be changed materially.

W. W. Francis is the choice for treasurer.

W. L. Jackson has a clean sweep for superintendent on the democratic ticket and J. W. Miller on the republican ticket.

A. L. Geddes is nominated for surveyor by the republicans and perhaps by the democrats, and Wm. Fortmiller for coroner.

T. J. Butler has a big majority for county commissioner.

The vote for president in the three Albanites and Price was La Follette 95, Roosevelt 185, Taft 170.

L. L. Swan is again nominated for justice on the republican ticket and John Catlin for constable in district 2, while A. H. Gould is probably nominated by democrats and perhaps Chas. Fox for constable.
