U. O. CASE REVERSED

Referendum to Go on the Ballot

The supreme court yesterday afternoon reversed the decision of Judge Galloway in the referendum case of the U. O., upholding the referendum, and the question of appropriation will be placed on the ballot at the general election.

The court declared that the drastic remedy of the injunction can be invoked only by a state acting through its proper law officer.

The court does not enter into the merits of the fraud part of the case at all, but simply decides that Friendly had no right to bring the injunction.
