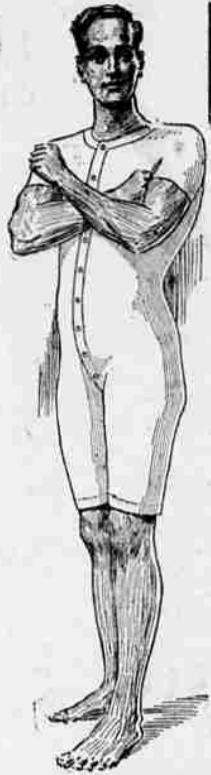

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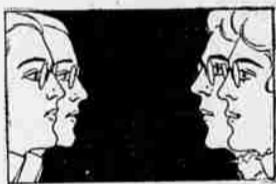

Looking After O. E. Affairs.

Chief Engineer L. B. Wickersham has been in the city, looking after Oregon Electric affairs, of which there are many at Albany, beginning with Burkhardt Park Addition, and thence westward two streets, either Fifth, where rails have been laid to the site of a fine depot that will go up at Lyon street, or Water, where the company is doing things, not only putting in railroad bridges at Penny-winkle and over the gulch between Oak and Sherman, but as well city bridges, covering the street, and further west from Lyon to Ferry street preparing to fill the street to grade, jointly with the S. P. if that road will come to time. In the western part of the city, two engineering affairs under Mr. Wickersham are being well taken care of by Mr. Scott. Just now this is certainly an O. E. center.

NEW COURSE FOR SCHOOLS

A Manual Training Department to be Added.

That a thorough course in manual training and domestic science will be included in the curriculum of the Albany city schools for the ensuing year has been practically agreed upon by the members of the local school board.

For the purpose of obtaining first hand information on the subject, Hon. J. K. Weatherford, A. C. Schmitt, W. M. Parker, City Superintendent C. W. Boettcher, and J. L. Tomlinson inspected the manual training and domestic science departments of the Oregon Agricultural College and the Corvallis High school yesterday.

They were met at the train by President W. J. Kerr and Prof. Horner of the O. A. C. and City Superintendent R. W. Kirk of the Corvallis schools. From the instructors some valuable information was acquired as to the domestic science and manual training departments, including the cost of installing the same and maintenance during the school term.

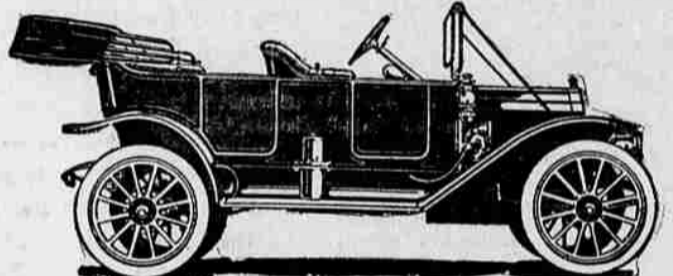
As a result of the investigation made at Corvallis it is practically certain that the course will be included next year and that the best teachers obtainable will be employed to conduct the work.
