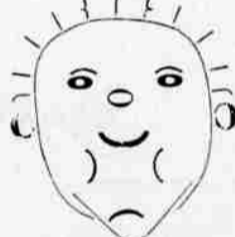

### TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

**A School Panic.**  
**St. Louis, Nov. 28.**—A panic occurred at the Blair school to-day, and nothing but the great presence of mind of the crops of teachers prevented a great loss of life. The steam heating apparatus got out of order, and the rattling in coils, coupled with the escaping steam, alarmed the children, who, fearing an explosion, started for the door. Miss Bettina Krebs, the teacher in charge, got to the door first and prevented a stampede, scarcely had order been restored, however, when the noise in the steam pipes was repeated with increased violence, and before Miss Krebs could reach the door the second time the terror stricken children had gained the hall. The faithful teacher was borne to the floor trampled upon, sustaining serious injuries.

**New Organization.**  
**INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 28.**—A meeting was held to night at the Hendricks Club rooms by some three score democratic G. A. R. veterans, at which an organization was perfected known as "The Democratic Soldiers' and Sailors' Veteran Association of Indiana." This organization is the result of what has been termed a revolt against the G. A. R. The object of the new organization is set forth in the following preamble to their constitution and by-laws: The purpose of this association shall be to inculcate true principles of patriotism, love of country and to foster and maintain true democratic principles in the administration of the government, both state and national, and secure a pure, simple and efficient administration of the same, and to resist with all our might any and every encroachment upon the constitutional rights and liberties of the people.

**Mrs. Sherman Dead.**  
**CHICAGO, Nov. 28.**—Mrs. William T. Sherman died at 10 o'clock this morning at her residence No. 75 West Seventh street, in New York. Mrs. Sherman slept quietly during a short period last night, but at 8 o'clock this morning it became apparent that she could live but a few hours. General Sherman was notified, and he and the children who live at home, Rachael, Lizzie and Tecumseh, were at the bedside when Mr. Sherman breathed her last.

**Jay Eye See.**  
**RACINE, Wis., Nov. 28.**—Yesterday Jay Eye See, the famous trotter, owned by J. I. Case, stepped on some sharp substance and severed the main artery of the left leg, and before assistance could arrive the racer was almost dead from loss of blood. It is doubtful if he survives. The animal is valued at \$40,000.

**Yellow Fever in New York.**  
**NEW YORK, Nov. 28.**—Another case of yellow fever was reported by Dr. George Wilson to-night, in the person of Raphael Delano of 76 Mulberry street. Delano arrived from Jacksonville with his wife and two children to-day, and was taken sick soon after arrival. Shortly after noon black vomit began, and the doctor at once notified the police and board of health, who at once had him removed to the reception hospital. As the man has family at once went to the densely populated Italian quarters, fears are entertained that the germs may have spread.
