TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

A Bad Gambler.
DENVER, Colo., Dec. 10.—Some time ago, in Portland, Or., James A. Weiler married a Miss Clara Meyer, who was the possessor of several thousand dollars. Coming to Denver on a wedding tour, Weiler thought it would be a good plan to increase his wife's fortune at the gaming table, but unfortunately lost all. On hearing it Mrs. Weiler commenced action against the proprietors of the gambling house for the recovery of \$2000. After a brief trial the jury to-day brought in a verdict in favor of the plaintiff for \$2000.

The River and Harbor Bill.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—The river harbor bill has been completed by the committee, and will be reported to the house early this week. It appropriates in round numbers \$12,000,000. The exact amounts appropriated for special localities cannot be given to-night, but approximate estimates include the following: Improving the Missouri river, \$375,000; Columbia river, Oregon \$250,000; Oakland harbor, California, \$237,000; Yaquina bay, \$65,000; Humboldt, \$65,000.

The Coroner's Inquest.
BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Dec. 10.—The coroner's inquest is endeavoring to get at the bottom facts in Saturday night's massacre. The excitement still runs very high. People are divided over the action of the officers. One very remarkable feature is that nearly every man killed was shot in the back, showing that the crowd turned around when being fired upon.

To Pension Mrs. Sheridan.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—The house committee on invalid pensions, has authorized a favorable report on the senate bill, granting a pension of \$350 to the widow of General Sheridan.

Trouble Brewing.
ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 10.—At a meeting at the foreign office high military authorities urged that an ultimatum be sent to the Persian government warning it that Russia would take steps for the occupation of Persia unless it cancelled the treaty opening up the Karun county to the English. De Giers opposed such a course and advised the government to proceed with moderation.

Scalded to Death.
PUYALLUP, W. T., Dec. 10.—At 8 o'clock this morning the passenger train from Tacoma to Seattle, standing on the main track here, having but just arrived, was run into from the rear by way freight train No. 18, of thirteen cars, Engineer Doane. The freight engine crashed ten feet into the Pullman "Mandan." Mrs. T. B. Wilcox of Portland on a pleasure trip with her husband, was in the Pullman dressing room and was fatally scalded by escaping steam. Another lady had her ankle sprained by jumping from the car.

An Explosion.
CHICAGO, Dec. 11.—An explosion occurred at the oatmeal mills at the corner of Halstead and Fulton streets, at 2 o'clock this morning and the building is now burning. It is reported at the police station that several lives were lost.
