## TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

### A Mass Meeting.

SPOKANE FALLS, Dec. 11.—A mass meeting was held here to-night to take action to secure the early admission of Washington territory into the Union. There was a large attendance and great enthusiasm. Citizens of all classes and parties were present. It was decided to suggest a plan for county meetings December 20, to select delegates on a certain basis of the vote cast for delegate at the last election, the delegates chosen by the counties meet in territorial convention January 3 take united action.

### Blood in Their Eyes.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 11.—Orders were issued by the navy department to-day for the United States steamers Galena and Yantic to sail from New York to-morrow for Port-au-Prince, Hayti, to enforce the demand of this government for the release of the American steamer Haytian Republic. They will sail in company and be under the command of Rear-Admiral Luce, who has been instructed to transfer his flag from the Richmond to the Galena. The owner of the Haytian Republic, by special permission of the secretary of the navy, will be a passenger on the Galena.

### The Big Four.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—The distribution of federal patronage, and especially the cabinet positions from New York state, seems to be arousing some feeling among the "big four," Platt, Miller, Hiscock and Merton. It would seem that Platt and Miller both desire to be called into Harrison's cabinet. It is said that a way out of the difficulty in New York has been proposed. It is suggested that Senator Everts be offered the mission to St. James, that Warner Miller be elected to the senate, and that Platt be taken into the cabinet.

### An Exciting Election.

BOSTON, Dec. 11.—To-day's election closed one of the most exciting municipal campaigns ever carried in this city. Bitter personalities have characterized all sides, and especially has this been the case in the discussion of the public school question, the principal issue of the campaign. The unusual interest aroused in the question was most notable among women voters, and is shown by the fact that while only 837 women were registered for the municipal election last year, and only 775 voted, the total registration this year reached 20,206. The probability is that the complete republican ticket for school committee, as endorsed by the committee of 100, is elected.

### The Pope's Aid.

ROME, Dec. 11.—A sensation has been caused by the pope's refusal to cress medals and reliquaries sent to Rome by an Irish priest, who intended them for distribution in Ireland. The pope sternly said: "I cannot best them. The people of Ireland are disobedient. They seem to prefer the gospel of Dillon and O'Brien to the gospel of Jesus Christ."

### A Big Drop.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 11.—This morning the California Refinery Company issued a new price schedule. Granulated sugar is now 7 1/2 cents a pound, or 1 cent lower than yesterday. Confectioners A is 7 cents and other white grades 7 1/2 cents. A further cut is looked for.

### A Boat Ashore.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 10.—The whale-back tug Thistle is ashore, high and dry, at Rogue river. She was driven on the beach during the recent storm. Capt Reed of the New Zealand Insurance Company has gone north to see about launching her again. She is insured for \$2500 in his company, the same in the South British, and \$5000 in Gutte & Frank's agencies.
