Not Guilty.
TACOMA, W. T., Dec. 12.—Col. J. C. Haines arrived in the city from Auburn, N. Y., this morning. He was met at the depot by Capt. W. J. Fife and other members of the Tacoma Guards, and escorted to the Tacoma, where received, until late this afternoon the congratulations of numerous friends here. It will be remembered that Col. Haines was recently acquitted of a charge of conspiracy in the Gardner smuggling case, and it is for this reason he was given such a reception here.

Will Pass.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—Senat Mitchell says a canvass of the senate has been made in regard to the passage of the river and harbor bill at this session, and that a large majority of the senators are in favor of passing such bill.

A High License.
SAN BERNARDINO, Dec. 12.—The board of city trustees has passed an ordinance raising the city liquor license from \$10 a month to \$50, closing saloons at midnight, exacting heavy bonds from keepers of saloons, and providing for forfeiture of bonds and license if there is disorder on the premises, gambling or other violation of the ordinance.

First Snow of the Season.
ST. PAUL, Dec. 12.—Reports from various parts of Minnesota and Dakota say that the first snowfall of the season was that of to day, which amounted to from one to inches.

In The Neck.
SEAKIM, Dec. 12.—The rebels maintain a heavy musketry fire. Their commander Osman Naib, has been wounded in the neck by the explosion of a shell. The shells fired at the rebels are doing heavy damages.

Cool Men.
OSWEGO, N. Y., Dec. 12.—During Mrs. Langtry's performance here to-night, in the academy of music, as the curtain was about to rise on the last act, there was a cry of fire from the rear of the hall, and thick clouds of smoke poured up through the large register in the middle aisle. A crackling of flames was heard underneath the floor, and the large audience were panic-stricken. Cool headed men sprang upon the stage and called out to the people that there was no danger. Others mounted their chairs in every part of the house and called upon the people to remain cool. This succeeded in partially quieting the people, and in two minutes the theater was cleared just as the flames sprung up through the floor.

A. W. T. Mine.
SEATTLE, Dec. 12.—Superintendent Watkins has 500 men at work flooding the Franklin mine, which ignited yesterday from fire from the engine. Nineteen hundred feet of hose was taken from here this morning to assist in extinguishing the fire. It is thought, here, that the conflagration can be quenched in a short time, though the work is extremely difficult, owing to black damp. Six men brought out of the mine this evening overcome with damp, but recovered.
