What They Will Do.
PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 19.—The Philadelphia
Press says: It is quite decided that upon the
expiration of his term President and Mrs. Cleve-
land will reside at Orange, N. J. Cleveland will
have important business occupations at New
York. He has been offered the management of
several important financial institutions in New
York city and it is understood he has decided
to accept one of these offers. He has also been
tendered a law partnership in New York but
has determined not to return to the practice of
law.

Platt Snubbed.
NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—Levi P. Morton last
night held a formal conference with Thomas C.
Platt and leaders of the Platt faction at the
Fifth Avenue hotel. He informed them that
Harrison had decided not to call the leader of
any faction to his cabinet. If New York can-
not unite on some one the state will not be re-
presented.

Even on Watermelons.
BLACKVILLE, S. C., Dec. 19.—A meeting of
watermelon raisers, representing the production
of 2,000,000 melons, was held here, and it was
decided to form a trust to limit the acreage, fix
prices and establish their own agencies in the
principal cities.

Judge Burke's Appointment.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 19.—The president sent
to the senate the nomination of Thos. Burke of
Washington territory, to be chief justice of the
supreme court of the territory, vice Chas. E.
Boyle, deceased.

SEATTLE, W. T., Dec. 18.—News of the
prompt appointment of Judge Thomas Burke
of Seattle to be chief justice of the territory was
received with great satisfaction in this city.

Will Sustain.
NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—Judge Lawrence of
the supreme court, handed down to-day find-
ings sustaining the will of Samuel J. Tilden. It
is understood that the case will not be contested
so the city gets \$4,000,000 for its library.

Trouble With Negroes.
WAHALAK, Miss., Dec. 19.—A report has
just reached here that an armed posse overtook
four negroes, participants in Sunday night's
tragedy. One resisted and was riddled with
bullets. The other three were hanged to the
surrounding trees. The posse has run down all
the negroes who fled to the hills on the night of
the affray. There are at least fifteen other negroes
in hiding.
