The secretary of the interior has rendered a
decision in the case of the state of Oregon vs.
the United States, in which is involved about
90,800 acres of land in the Lakeview land dis-
trict, comprising what is known as swamp land
list number five. It appears from the records
that these lands inured to the state as swamp
lands, under the act of September 28, 1850, and
as extended by the act of March 12, 1860.
Prior to certification, the greater part of these
lands were sold by the state to various parties
in large bodies, and upon reports of special
agents of the department, certification was final-
ly made.

Subsequently it was reported to the depart-
ment that the reports of Special Agent Ankeney
and State Agent Whittaker were false and
fraudulent, and that a large part of the land de-
scribed in these reports as swamp were really
high and dry. An investigation was ordered,
and Special Agent Shackelford was directed to
make a personal examination. His report
shows that of the 90,800 acres comprising list
No. 5, not over 34,000 acres can be classed as
swamp, and that of this latter amount over 20,-
000 acres are situated on hills, steep mountains,
or sage brush deserts.

This report was duly verified, and an oral
hearing ordered, in which the state was rep-
resented by counsel. The secretary reviews in
detail the evidence and law applicable to the
case and finds that the certification by Sec-
retary Teller was procured by fraud, and that
had he (Teller) known the facts in the case as
they have been developed certification would
never have been made.

The secretary orders the certification set
aside, and directs the commissioner of the gen-
eral land office to prepare another list which
shall contain lands known to be swamp.

As to other lands, an investigation is ordered,
and such lands in the list as are found to be
not swamp are ordered to be restored to the
public domain, subject to any rights which
may have attached to them under the laws.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

River and Harbor Bill.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—It is said here that
President Cleveland has given notice that he
will veto the river and harbor bill. Representa-
tive Orain, of Texas, went up to call on him;
with a party of people from Galveston who are
interested in the improvement of the harbors of
that city, and they were told very plainly that
if they expected any legislation in that direction
they would do well to bring it to the White
House as a separate measure, and not as a part
of the river and harbor bill.

A Collision.

DENVER, Dec. 28.—A Colorado Springs
special says two freight on the Rock Island,
running twenty miles an hour, collided in a
sharp and deep cut near Tiptop, early this
morning, completely demolishing both engines
and trains, and instantly killing fireman Har-
ding and crushing the skull and otherwise injur-
ing engineer Hoge so that he cannot live until
morning. Engineer E. O. Carr received severe
injuries in the back and head. Fireman Hentz
suffered a fractured hip, an injured shoulder
and severe wounds on the head, and it is feared
they will prove fatal.

An Unequal Contest.

CINCINNATI, Dec. 28.—A Commercial Gaze-
ette special from Sabina, Ohio, says a fox drive
took place near there to-day, in which nearly
400 persons, men and boys participated. Only
two foxes were scared up and both escaped.

A Big Shortage.

BOSTON, Dec. 28.—The Boston Commercial
Bulletin, in an annual report of the wool mark-
ets of the United States, will show to-morrow
that the present supply of wool is 62,000,000
pounds, against 110,000,000 pounds at the same
date last year, or a shortage of 48,000,000
pounds as compared with 1887.

Bloody Fight.

FREDERICKSBURG, Va., Dec. 28.—A
bloody battle between whites and blacks is
reported as having taken place at Tackett's
mills, Stafford county, on Christmas even-
ing. A political discussion led to a wran-
gle between a white man named Bennett
Hiffer and a colored man. Both indulged
in personalities, which ended with a fight.
A general riot was the result. Hiffer was
shot and instantly killed. His colored
enemy was also shot. Twenty people are
reported as dangerously injured.

A Heavy Tax.

SACRAMENTO, Dec. 28.—The taxes of the
Southern Pacific Company for 1888-89,
amounting to \$521,679.70, were paid into
the state treasury to-day. It took the treas-
urer's force several hours to count the
money, which was contained in sacks of
\$20,000 each. The coin comes into the
treasury at an opportune time, as everything
against the general fund is now payable.
