The new South is getting to the front rapidly.  
Georgia has appropriated \$20,000 for the open-  
ing up of a bureau of immigration, which is to  
advertise the resources and attractions of the  
state, and a movement has been initiated in  
Alabama to induce all the legislatures south of  
the Potomac to make liberal appropriations for  
the encouragement of immigration. Capital  
and new blood will inspire the South to greater  
efforts in the march of progress and develop-  
ment.  
Up at Troy and Cohoes the manufacturers  
are cutting down the wages of their workmen in  
a way that strikes terror to the hearts of their  
poor families. If the Democrats had carried the  
recent election how these chaps would have  
slashed an extra slice out of the wages of their  
men—and the charging the deduction to the  
terrors of Free Trade.

Office statistics show in Illinois, farm mort-  
gages amounting to \$100,000,000 and an im-  
mense number of chattel mortgages in the cities,  
on personal property. In several hundred cases  
the personal clothing is mortgaged to procure  
food. These things account for the ease with  
which votes are bought. It is debt and poverty  
on one side and temptation on the other.

It is stated in Eastern papers that the faculty  
of Dartmouth, one of the oldest and leading  
colleges of the country, has decided that no  
student who smokes shall hold a scholarship in  
that institution. The reasons assigned for the  
inhibition of tobacco are the expense to those  
of small means and injury to mind and body in  
the formative stages. This is believed to be a  
step in advance of any other prominent college.

**TELEGRAPHIC NEWS**  
**Oregon War Claims.**  
**SALEM, Dec. 31.**—Hon George W Mc-  
Bride, secretary of state, has received notice  
from Washington that the first installment  
of the claims of this state for the money  
expended in carrying out the Indian wars  
of 1877-78 have been examined by the mil-  
itary board appointed for that purpose, and  
by them returned to the secretary of war  
with a recommendation that they be al-  
lowed thereon the sum of \$33,132.98. This  
is the claim mentioned by *The Oregonian*  
a few days ago as having been made and  
submitted by the secretary of state during  
the past year. Final proof on the remain-  
der of these claims will be made within a  
few weeks. Secretary McBride is confi-  
dent that the state will receive a further  
allowance. The secretary of state has also  
been engaged in preparing and forwarding  
to John Mullan, agent of the state, at Wash-  
ington, additional proofs in support of the  
state claims for expenses incurred during  
the war of the rebellion, which were re-  
jected last summer by the third auditor of the  
treasury. These proofs are now being  
used in Washington, both upon an appeal  
from the decision of the auditor and in  
support of the bill now pending in con-  
gress, especially directing a re-examination  
of these claims.

**Blaine Goes to Washington.**  
**AUGUSTA, Me., Dec. 31.**—James G. Blaine  
slipped off so quickly by Saturday's train for  
the west that his departure was not known until  
yesterday, when it leaked out that he had left  
for Washington. He is accompanied by his son  
Walker.

**The President's Reception.**  
**WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.**—At the president's  
New Year's reception Mrs. Cleveland will be  
assisted by Miss Bayard, Mrs. Fairchild, Mrs.  
Whitney and Mrs. Dickinson.

**A New Bank at Heppner.**  
**WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.**—Comptroller of cur-  
rency has authorized the National bank of  
Heppner, Or., to commence business with a  
capital of \$50,000.

**Mayor to The Last.**  
**NEW YORK, Dec. 31.**—Mayor Hewitt, who  
retires from office to-day, made the appointment  
to-day of D. Luther Smith as commissioner of  
public works. This keeps Tammany Hall out  
of the biggest sort of patronage, which was sus-  
pected at the immediate command of Grant,  
who becomes mayor to-morrow. Mayor Hewitt  
also, before retiring, appointed in the afternoon  
Edward L. Parvis commissioner of taxes and  
assessments. He took the oath.
