PESTS.

Legislation will be presented to the Legislature for providing the ways of exterminating the pests that infest Oregon fruits. Horticultural Association will cause to be in this purpose. It is too late in these columns, but for the creation of a board of horticulture, consisting of one appointed by the Governor for each of the five districts into which the state is to be divided. The Board is to meet twice a year and devise ways to extirpate fruit pests. For appropriating \$8000 for two years, commencing next year, to meet the expenses of the board. Expressing an opinion as to this bill, we do not hesitate to say that it should be passed, and that it is almost criminal for the Legislature not to take action now. It is generally known, yet it is no secret, that preparations are being made in Western Oregon, (and Eastern Oregon, also) to plant more fruit trees than has been planted in years. The fruit industry is in its infancy. On all sides farmers and others are going into the business. Enough is already being produced in the very front of the producing states. Let the Legislature take action.

WEATHER BUREAU.

Introduced in the legislature is a bill for the establishment of a State Weather Service. The Service shall consist of an assistant director and one or more observers in every county in the State. A sum of ten thousand dollars is asked for the necessary instruments. This bill has the approval of the State Board of Horticulture. The bill should pass for day by the Legislature. Signal reports and meteorological discoveries are becoming more and more important to all classes of people. Disposed of by the government last year are homestead and other lands 16,319,076 acres, an area more than the State of Pennsylvania and 100,000 farms of 160 acres each. Lands disposed of by the government last year, 1,000,000 acres, to which should be added 90,000 acres sold by the land grant making the total lands disposed of last year 1,090,000 acres. This is more than that of France and Germany combined. Five States as large as Pennsylvania are to be carved out of the territory thus disposed of in less than a single decade. Is it not a fact that half a dozen new States are to be admitted into the Union?

Payn, the novelist and correspondent, writes to the conclusion that the only salvation for our writers and literary classes is in going to bed early, getting ten hours of sleep, and understanding that brain work is more complete and certain recuperation than ordinary physical labor. The office and study of sleep is getting to be better appreciated. Little is heard nowadays about burn-out. Obedience to physiological laws will enable a man to escape mental exhaustion at an early age. Genius cannot be taught. It is impossible to turn night into day, or to habitually do two days work in one. Common sense and method are better than any amount of brilliance, and judgment is in the end more than genius.
