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LOCAL RECORD.

ARRESTED FOR BIGAMY.—Last Monday R. H. Volrath entered a complaint in Justice Luckey's court charging W. L. Coshaw with the crime of bigamy. On Wednesday Mr. Coshaw appeared for examination, represented by Attorneys J. F. Moore and J. N. Duncan, the prosecution being conducted by Geo. W. Barnes. After hearing the evidence, Justice Luckey held the defendant in \$500 bonds to appear before the next grand jury. The case arose from Coshaw having married Volrath's divorced wife within six months after he (Coshaw) had obtained a divorce from his former wife. Mrs. Volrath obtained a divorce at the last spring term of Circuit Court, and Mr. Coshaw at the fall term in October, after which they were soon married.—Ochoco Review. Mr. Coshaw is a former resident of Brownsville.

L. AND B. ASSOCIATION.—To-night a meeting will be held at the store of Stewart & Sox for the purpose of organizing a Loan and Building Association. These are becoming important institutions in our cities, and it is needed here, as it will stimulate building, and as well offer an opportunity for investing small amounts of money. Under most companies the shares are payable in installments of \$1 a month until they reach the face, \$100, and members may take any number of shares up to a certain limit, generally not exceeding twenty-five, thus preventing one or two men getting control of it. The object is to loan money for building purposes, and in order to borrow it is necessary to belong to the association. As a business affair it is a success, and it is to be hoped our citizens will respond to the call.

THEY LOST.—The potato market of San Francisco, which took a sudden drop about a month ago, is said to be looking up considerably. The fall in prices was caused by the rush of Oregon products to that market, and in consequence of the glut, half of those who shipped lost by the transaction. Some of the shipments actually rotted before a disposition could be made of them. One farmer in the interior, who sent about 500 sacks to the bay city, found himself out about ten cents per sack when settling up time came.—Telegram. Those who shipped from Albany nearly all made by the transaction.

INSURANCE COMPANIES.—The Lakeview Examiner attacks insurance companies like this: "The San Francisco Chronicle is making it decidedly warm for the insurance compact on this coast. The rates are simply outrageous, and nothing more than robbery, and our poor devils east of the Cascades are still further robbed by being obliged to pay fifty per cent. advance on exposures. We would rejoice greatly if this robbing insurance compact could be broken."

SHUT DOWN FOR THE WINTER.—Searle & Deane completed their contract yesterday, which takes the O. P. road almost to Breitenbush's. They men are expected in the city to-night. They were paid off in cash on the spot. This firm have shown themselves to be first-class, reliable railroad builders, and, we understand, and hope, have made money on their contract. Work has now, and not until now, ceased for the winter, on this road. An early start is anticipated in the spring as soon as the weather permits.

RAILROAD MEETING.—The committee appointed at a recent meeting of citizens to draft articles of incorporation for the building of a railroad from this city to Astoria, is ready to report, and for the purpose of hearing and acting on their report a citizens meeting will be held at the G. A. R. Hall to-morrow evening at 7:30 o'clock, to which all interested in building the railroad are requested to be present. By order of the chairman.

LIVELY.—The traffic on the Willamette is very lively at present, says a Portland paper. The steamers Orient, Occident and Champion are now plying between Portland and the upper country. Last week they brought down more than 600 tons of produce, and they will probably do better this week.

ICE WANTED.—Mr. Harry Day has rented the building just east of the Magnolia Mills, and intends storing four hundred tons of ice, should there be any ice, and running a regular ice wagon next summer. Mr. F. H. Pfeiffer will also store several hundred tons, if he can get it.
