LOCAL RECORD.

HILTON.—Saturday evening Major Hilton delivered an eloquent address on the "Relationships of the Government to the Liquor Traffic," to a big house. Yesterday he spoke four times, at the Presbyterian Church in the morning, to men only in the afternoon, to the M. Y. P. A. of the Methodist Church and at the Opera House in the evening. In his meeting for men he spoke very logically and pointedly on blasphemy, gambling and social impurity; in the evening on "The Relationship of the Missionary cause to the liquor traffic," which was one of the most forcible temperance addresses ever delivered in the city. After the lecture a subscription was circulated to raise \$500 to clear the indebtedness on the W. C. T. U. Hall. Mr. E. W. Walters, a lawyer, traveling through the State subscribed \$250, \$82 additional was subscribed.

HEINE.—Here is what the *Commonwealth*, of Boston, says of Heine, who will be here Wednesday evening: "Mr. Peck's popular concerts on Wednesday and Thursday evenings drew full audiences, and the performances gave entire satisfaction. The great attraction of both entertainments was Mr. Josef Heine, the blind violinist, who created a veritable furor. He is a superb artist, and his rendition of Ernst's difficult transcription from "Il Pirata" was faultlessly played. His intonation is perfect and his execution thorough. His tone is full and round, and his expression exquisite. The most complicated passages came from under his hand with a purity that left nothing to be desired. The audience was quite carried away with him, and greeted him with the most enthusiastic applause."

A STREET CAR PROPOSITION.
At the council meeting to-morrow evening Councilman Deyoe will present a proposition from J. R. Neil, of Crete, Nebraska, a former friend of Mr. Deyoe, and a man of wealth, in which he will offer to build a street car line in Albany in consideration simply of an exclusive franchise for twenty-five years. He proposes to construct the line from the St. Charles hotel to the S. P. depot, and as business justifies will extend it. He agrees to run at least two cars continually for twenty-five years, will only charge 5 cents fare, however far the line is extended, and will bind himself to begin work within ninety days from the time the franchise is granted. In this day of bonuses this is a marvelously liberal proposition, and the franchise, the only thing asked, should be granted at once, without any delay. If it is not, Albany might as well kick itself out of any expectations at all. There should be no delay in the matter. Street cars would add in a great degree to the metropolitan appearance of things, and the offer is one rarely received.

WAS IT GENUINE.—In our account of the Hilton meeting elsewhere is mentioned a subscription to the W. C. T. U. fund of \$200 by a Lawyer Walters, of Philadelphia, etc. On making the subscription he stated that he was stopping at the Russ House. No such man has been registered there; but we are informed that the gentleman registered as J. P. Horner, of Chicago, is the same gentleman, as well as the one who addressed a Sabbath school. Mr. Horner left on the morning train, and no check for \$200 has been received yet from E. W. Walters. We make no charges at present, but simply give the present status of the matter until further developments, hoping there is some mistake; but fearing otherwise. Even should it be as suspected no one will be out anything except expectations and the fact of having been taking in a little.

THAT FISH LADDER.—The following from the *Portland Welcome* is timely, and we second the motion: "A few years since the Oregon legislature appropriated \$10,500 to construct a fishladder at the Oregon City falls, and placed the sum by law in the hands of the then governor for disbursement for that purpose. The money came to his hands, and there never has been such fishladder constructed, other than a pretended attempt by a contractor for \$1350, and lasted only a few weeks as a show, which we are informed has not been settled for within \$300. Those interested in the culture of salmon in these waters, especially of the upper Willamette, should agitate the present legislature to investigate this omission and demand an account of this fishladder fund."

HOW TO CURE THEM.—And now a cure for red noses is going the rounds. The stuff used looks like red Jersey mud. It is applied in a damp state, and then the nose is covered with it when the owner of the organ retires for the night.
