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LOCAL RECORD.

STATE LEGISLATURE.

Monday, Feb. 11.

Crook's bill for a \$14,000 wagon road in Curry county passed the Senate, also Robert's bill for a \$15,000 wagon road in Coos county; also Fell's bill for a \$10,000 wagon road in Morrow county; also Maxwell's bill for a \$11,000 wagon road in Tillamook county. Consideration of Dawson's bill regulating foreign corporations and Morelock's bill for improving the soda springs at Sodaville were indefinitely postponed. Eakin's bill allowing Lane county to issue \$60,000 in bonds to build Court House was passed; also bill prohibiting use of 5 mill tax other than for school purposes. Memorial, praying Congress to set aside public park in Cascades. The committee reported favorably on the Albany charter bill and it was ordered engrossed. Dawson's R. R. Com. bill passed. Condon's University bill passed the House. A bill prohibiting the marriage of first cousins was lost. The Portland water bill was discussed and voted on, failing to pass over the Governor's veto by a vote of 37 to 22.
