## STATE LEGISLATURE.

Thursday, Feb. 14th.

A vote on reconsidering the Portland water bill was taken up and it was lost. Harrington though in his turn, called up the same bill, which had been introduced simultaneously with the one in the Senate, and it was voted on and passed 37 to 19. It will pass the Senate; but will there be time to wait for the veto and get it through over his head this session is the question.

The bills to relocate county seats of Polk and Gilliam counties passed in the Senate. Numerous committee reports were presented and bills ordered engrossed. Coggeswell's bill creating Hamilton Co. passed. Irvine's bill amending Albany charter passed. Dawson's bill prohibiting killing of Chinese pheasants between January 1st and July 15th was reported favorably on. Dawson's bill to protect sheep husbandry was indefinitely postponed. A favorable report was made on Cauthorn's bill permitting construction of bridge at Corvallis. Cauthorn's bill providing for support of Agricultural College passed the House. Hatch's State Normal school bill failed to pass. Bill consolidating Portland, East Portland and Albina passed.
