STATE LEGISLATURE.

Wednesday, Feb. 20th. In the Senate bill creating Harney county passed; also Wagers bill providing for cancelling county warrants in seven years; also Tongue's bill for preventing spreading of disease among stock; also State board of horticulture bill; also Fullerton's Southern Oregon Board of Agriculture. In House. Tongue's Senate bill for licensing stallions was reconsidered and passed; bill providing for relocation of county seat of Grant Co. passed; R. R. Commission bill passed over head of Governor, 47 to 12; bill making school book changes only every six years passed; bill for public soda springs in Linn county was indefinitely postponed; bill for health officer at Yaquina Bay passed; Myers bill for constitutional convention failed. At a caucus of republicans Wednesday evening Robert Clow, Calvig, of Douglas and and Fall, of Baker City, were nominated for R R Commissioners and will be elected by the Legislature.

Mill City.

There might such a thing exist among some of the readers of your valuable paper, who have not heard of the enterprising town, Mill City, so if you will pardon me for the liberty I have taken in writing a few lines, and publish, what the town is composed of, which will undoubtedly be interesting to, at least some of the readers. Situated on the right and left bank of the Santiam River is this rapidly growing town, about 36 miles east of Albany, on the Oregon Pacific R. R. upon a level, bounded by a gentle, sloping bluff. The advantages this river pertains at this place, induced a company (called the Santiam Mill Co.) to erect a saw mill with a cutting capacity of 50,000 feet daily, when in full running order, will employ about 50 men, prospects for Galena mines are bright not a great distance from here, as yet, this town is in its infancy and its rapid growth proves it to make the leading city on the Oregon Pacific Railroad. Patrick O'Reilly, the enterprising raecruz, real estate owner is occasionally seen on our streets. We thus far had very pleasant weather up in our sections, this winter very little rain since December, until the latter part of last week it changed to a rather cool northern wind and little snow. A sociable dance was held at the Gates hotel, Gatesville, last Thursday evening, in honor of Ed Collins who left Saturday for Washington Territory. The attendance was fair and every one seemed to be well satisfied with the proceedings. That party who shows people how to run messages in the ground, is very kind, but his leaving the wire disconnected makes it very inconvenient for those who must go 15 to 20 miles to connect wire. The hotel in course of construction at this place and which is under the management of Mr. J. D. Stewart will be ready for guests in a few weeks. The Santiam Mill Co. has enlarged their store room by adding it to the room which was used as a sleeping apartment. Wm. Lowland has accepted a position as clerk in this establishment. The dance that occurred some nights previous, in the so-called new hall, was a grand affair, everybody seemed to have enjoyed themselves amazingly well. Mr. John Shaw, one of the firm of the Santiam Mill Co. made a business trip to Willamette Valley, last week, and Mr. Thomas Sims made a flying trip to Portland.
