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LOCAL RECORD.

LEBANON.—There was a little unpleasantness at the school meeting in the adjoining district north of town. The belligerents both left the marks of battle, but were separated without a great loss of blood. We understand that there was an attempt to use deadly weapons, but friends interfered and prevented what might have been a very serious matter. The difficulty was between Mr. George Ross and J. Keebler, and originated at the school meeting. Mrs. Biggers, of Seio, has bought the Liggett house, on Main street, adjacent to Mr. Blythe's and has moved into the same. We welcome this excellent Christian. The machinery of the saw mill which was burned last week has been sent to Albany for repairs. The mill will be removed to Lebanon and operated this summer. Mr. P. J. Foster and brother are talking about building a saw mill at Sweet Home. They wish the people to guarantee them \$500, and promise to repay each subscription in lumber at \$1 less than the custom price. They are the proprietors of the Sweet Home grist mill. Express.

WHY REMOVED.—A great deal has been said about Agent Coffey's removal from the Umatilla Agency. Here is Mr. C's version of the affair given a Salem paper: "Bartholemew Coffey, who was so summarily deposed from the Umatilla Indian Agency recently, is in the city and still wears a cheerful smile for his old Salem acquaintances. Mr. Coffey says he was removed without the slightest just cause by Inspector Saunders, who was only a few months in the service and who did not make a full and fair investigation, but took for granted the charges of some Indians who held a grudge against Coffey."

IN A NUTSHELL.—The Statesman in giving some good advice in reference to the proposed railroad to Astoria, ends up with: "and then either proceed to build the road or find some company that will." As the road would cost \$2,000,000 it is safe to say it will be the latter, and whenever any company comes along that will take hold of it, the Oregon Pacific will of course be tapped at Albany. That is the situation in a nutshell and talk can't make millions alone. We are willing for Salem to get all the roads it can; but this is the real solution of this question.

NOT YET TAKEN.—The following prepared by the State Board of Immigration shows the number of acres of land in some of the counties of the State now unclaimed: Benton, 63,800; Clackamas, 143,000; Clatsop, 152,000; Columbia, 107,000; Coos, 325,000; Curry, 172,000; Douglas, 300,000; Jackson, 175,000; Josephine, 145,000; Lane, 300,000; Linn, 44,800; Marion, \$220,000; Multnomah, 28,000; Polk, 54,000; Tillamook, 633,000; Washington, 49,000; Yamhill, 43,000; making a total of 3,461,800.

JUST WINK.—A Turner correspondent of a Salem paper says: "One of these days there will be a railroad from this place to the mining country and timber lands of the Cascade mountains, and if Salem wants any of the trade she must be moving before it is too late, for things won't always go as they are at present." SENSATIONAL R. R. NEWS.

"Now comes the Wabash & Pacific railroad company's engineers, twenty-five of them," says the Oregonian, "and camp in the Cascade mountain pass where the celebrated Oregon Pacific road expects to work through, and they tell a contractor of the Oregon Pacific that they will soon have their road located; that it will go to Albany and thence northwest to connect with the Astoria & Coast railroad near Tillamook. It may be a story got up for effect, of course, but in these times one knows not what to expect. All the railroads afloat are anxious to come to Oregon, by hook or crook, and we can't blame them, but all the same they won't all get here."

In connection with the above an article of a sensational nature in the Salem Statesman will be in place. It is claimed to be based on a letter from Washington, that the O. P. has failed to secure its right to certain passes, making the above story possible. That paper says: "This discovery probably gives an explanatory cue to the movements of other railroad engineers said to have been operating in the mountains recently, and if the statements of the department are absolutely correct, there may be quite a strife among different companies for the possession of the most desirable route over the Cascades. There are places along the line upon which the O. P. is building, where it is almost impossible to build another road, certainly not practicable, and so costly as to be almost out of question, hence any company desiring to reach deep water from the East, obtains an immense advantage in securing the first right of way. Herein lay one of the great elements of value in the O. P. line, and now it seems that company has neglected to take some requisite steps and is liable, if not likely, to lose its advantage, where it runs through government lands, for Uncle Sam is sometimes a stickler for red tape, and holds his beneficiaries to the letter of the law. There is no hearsay about this; the letter has been received from the department at Washington, but, of course, the authority whence it emanated may not be cognizant of all the facts."

CURRENCY.

OUR STREET RAILWAY.

Arrangements are being made for work on the street railway at as early a day as possible, and cars will be running almost before we are aware of it. Considerable inquiry has been made as to the nature of the articles of incorporation, hence we publish them in full:

We, E. J. Lanning, A. Hackleman, G. F. Simpson, W. F. Read, W. H. Goltra, M. Sternberg, W. C. Tweedale, S. E. Young, A. B. McIlwain and Chas. E. Wolverton, the undersigned, citizens and residents of the city of Albany in Linn County, State of Oregon, for the purpose of forming and creating a corporation under and by virtue of the general laws of Oregon, do hereby make, execute and subscribe the following articles of incorporation in triplicate, to-wit:

ARTICLE I.

The corporate name assumed by this incorporation and by which it shall be known and designated is and shall be the Albany Street Railway Company of Albany, Oregon.

ARTICLE II.

The enterprise, business, pursuit and occupation in which this corporation proposes to engage is to construct, equip, maintain and operate a street railway upon any and all streets within the corporate limits, now established or that may hereafter be established, of the city of Albany in Linn county, state of Oregon, either by horse power, motor, steam or any other power that may be convenient or necessary to be used in operating the same, together with all rolling stock, depots, stations, switches, turnouts and all appliances, rights, privileges and appurtenances necessary or convenient for the purposes of successfully maintaining and operating said railway.

To take and receive, have hold and enjoy franchises and privileges and to sell, convey and dispose of the same or any part thereof.

To carry, transport and transfer persons, goods, wares, merchandise, stock and all freights of whatsoever kind and description upon and over the lines of said railway, and to charge, receive and collect fares, tolls and freights for the same.

To purchase, receive, have, hold and enjoy real and personal property of whatsoever nature and description, and to let, lease, sell and dispose of the same or any part thereof.

To borrow money, and for that purpose to execute notes of hand and issue and sell bonds, mortgage and hypothecate its real and personal property, its franchises, rights and privileges or any other property belonging to said corporation or any part thereof.

To build and manufacture its cars, rolling stock and equipments, to build and construct bridges wherever necessary or convenient and to do any acts and things necessary or convenient to the successfully carry out and maintain the purposes and objects of this incorporation.

ARTICLE III.

The principal office of said corporation shall be at the city of Albany in Linn county, state of Oregon.

ARTICLE IV.

The duration of this incorporation shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE V.

The amount of the capital stock of this corporation is and shall be the sum of sixteen thousand (\$16,000) dollars.

ARTICLE VI.

The capital stock of this corporation shall be divided into six hundred forty shares, and the amount of each share shall be twenty-five (\$25) dollars.
