THE STALLION LAW.
We are under obligations to Hon. R. A. Irvine for a copy of the new stallion law, the principal provisions of which we publish by request of many horsemen in different parts of the county. A license, costing \$1.00 must be issued by the Clerk of the county in which the service is rendered, and is good only in the county in which issued.

Any owner of any stallion, desiring a license for said stallion, may file his petition therefor with the County Clerk of any county within this State. Such petition shall state specifically the name, color, age, breeder and last owner of said stallion, the name and breeding of sire, the name and breeding of dam, and name and breeding of the second dam of said stallion. If any of the foregoing facts required to be stated in said petition are not known to the petitioner, he shall state in said petition that such facts are unknown. Such petition shall be verified by the oath of the owner of such stallion, or by the lawful agent who has knowledge of the facts.

The license will be in force until Jan. 1st following its issue. A copy of the license must be posted at each place of standing in the county.
Any owner of any stallion within this State may file with the County Clerk of any county therein, on or before the first day of October of each year, a full and complete list of the mares served by such stallion within such county during that year. Such list shall contain the name, if any, and a brief description of all mares so served, the owners thereof, the terms on which each mare was bred, the amount of money due, or to become due, upon each mare and the time when payment thereof becomes due, and it shall be verified by the oath of the owner of such stallion or his lawfully authorized agent.

From the time of filing such list, the owner of such stallion shall have a lien upon each mare therein described and upon her colt if any, by said horse for the service fee due as thereon for one year from the date of such filing. Such lien may be removed within the time and in the same manner as a chattel mortgage is removed.

The fine for a violation of the above provisions, or for making any false statement in an application for a license or list of mares served, or for mutilating or destroying a posted license, is not less than \$5 nor more than \$250 or imprisonment in the county jail for not more than 90 days, the violation of the law being made a misdemeanor. Justice of the Peace have concurrent jurisdiction with the Circuit Court in the matter. The law went into effect on its approval by the Governor.
