LOCAL RECORD.

KEEP YOUR HANDS OUT.—The silent morning sheet up the street, that doesn't represent the sentiment of anything, because it is too cowardly to give an opinion on any subject, even to stand up for Albany millinery establishments when attacked by a newspaper in a neighboring city, will do well to keep its hands out of our quarrels with our contemporaries. If it would wake up enough to say something itself once in awhile it might have a little side show of its own. Don't talk about representing. The DEMOCRAT stands up for Albany, and it has never, on the other hand, stirred the Salem ladies. It said they dressed gaudily or something to that effect. Of course all of them do not. The St. Louis papers poke fun at the enormous feet of the Chicago women; but the Chicago women don't get mad. The DEMOCRAT knows so far as quality is concerned the Salem girls are not surpassed.

TRAMPS AND SMOKE.—Fifteen culprits tramped struck town yesterday noon, and to-day began plying their trade of begging. Marshal Hoffman soon had two burly, dirty fellows in the calaboose. About eleven o'clock they piled some wood around their stove and set fire to it. A dense smoke came from the latticed window, the fire bell rang, the doors were broken open and the tramps were found lying on the floor pretending to be asleep. Marshal Hoffman about that time towed in five other professors, who were placed inside with the rest. On one of them a bank book belonging to Judge R. P. Boise was found, a very suspicious occurrence. Our citizens must be on the alert and if any of those remaining not arrested appear for refreshment shoot them from their premises on the spot.

CROOK COUNTY.—Yesterday Sol Wood arrived here with a "sagebrush angel" whom he arrested near Meldrom's place on the desert. He is supposed to be one of a band of horse-thieves and says his name is Jackson, though parties who know him say that is not his real name. He gave Mr. Wood a lively chase before he would surrender. We understand that A. J. Tetherow has gone to South America to look for a location. Both of his ranches, one on Crooked river and one on Deschutes, are for sale. Many expressions of regret are heard because Hahn & Fried are retiring from business. Yet a good act to the community always follows a closing out sale.—Review.

FROM MT. JEFFERSON.—Mr. John Wise, who recently came down from the foot of Mt. Jefferson has shown the DEMOCRAT a fine specimen of ore heavy with metal. It assays about equal parts of gold and silver and contains several other minerals. Mr. Wise found it near Mt. Jefferson, about six miles from the line of the Oregon Pacific, knocking it off a ledge with a pick. Near the place was an old sluice box that looked as if it had lain there twenty years, showing that some day mining on a small scale had been done. Mr. Wise thinks there is a valuable ledge there.

HAILED.—Mr. D. P. Porter, of Shedd Station, informs the DEMOCRAT that on Wednesday that vicinity was visited by the biggest hail storm he has ever seen in Oregon. Some of the hail stones were great masses of frozen matter over two inches in circumference. Horses and cattle became frightened from the pelting and onion patches could be smelled for long distances, the tops in many cases being cut off. At Albany it lightened and there was a peal or two of thunder; but the hail failed to reach this far north.

EVERYBODY GO.—To-morrow evening is the time when the entertainment will be given for the benefit of the Erodolphian Society of the College. The Opera House should be filled. The 100 scenes are alone worth going many miles to see. Prof. Rominger's descriptions of Alaska are said to be fine. The scenes have been presented in Portland and East Portland before pleased audiences.

NATHAN BOND DEAD.—Mr. Nathan Bond, a well known and highly respected pioneer, died at his home on the Santiam Wednesday evening, March 13th, after a weeks illness, at the age of about 70. Mr. Bond came to Oregon in 1853 from Tennessee, and accumulated quite a property. Mrs. Bond, who survives him is lying very low and is not expected to live.

A FOOT RACE.—This morning on Ferry street opposite the Stevens property, a 100 yard foot race was run between Langdon, a sprinter who has been here before, and Harry M Berthune, champion of the United States. Langdon won. It was a double chuck. Langdon and Berthune, the latter under a different name, entered into an agreement with a sporting man, a Frenchman, of Portland, to come here and chuck the race in favor of Berthune, whom the Frenchman would back, and thus win Albany sports. Instead of doing this the two sprinters went in with the Albany men, putting up the money and chucked the race against the Frenchman, who is out \$1300. He squealed and took the matter to the district attorney for a warrant for their arrest; but, of course it was not granted. This is a fair sample of the foot races of the present day. Berthune, who won the championship at St. Louis last year, is the most celebrated runner in the world.

RIGHT OF MAY.—G. P. Terrill, of Mehama, has already secured the right of way for a railroad from Mill City via Mehama to Stayton, and says he will be able to obtain it for the whole line to Turner. He also says there is a great deal of lumber ordered at Mill City for Salem, provided rates via Albany can be made satisfactory and that people all along the line above named are very anxious to secure connection with Salem, and that steps are now being taken to induce the Southern Pacific to build a feeder when the right of way is completed, as it soon will be.—Salem Journal.
