Voluntary remarks were made by several ladies, the tone of which, showed their absolute trust in the Lord, and their firm belief that He would redeem his promises. These were followed by an instructive and interesting paper on Sabbath School work by Mrs. S. A. McAllister, the Superintendent of that department. The following report was submitted by the committee appointed to estimate the expense of opening the reading room: Your committee find that a capable and worthy christian young gentleman, is willing to serve as librarian and janitor, also of the reading room for the very reasonable sum of \$2.50 per week, would also for an extra compensation serve as janitor for our public hall, if desired. We have estimated also that at least \$25 per year would be required for periodicals. Our estimate, after investigating as to the expense of furnishing the room is as follows: Window shades, \$9; scrim for short curtains, 50c; repair of book-case and table, \$1.50; bracket lamp, \$1.50; cuspidors, \$1; paper-racks, \$1. Total, \$34.50.

We also recommend that a donation of chair-cushions be solicited in connection with our proposed book-social. That a dozen or more of the chairs be painted afresh, and that at least \$5 be expended in procuring entertaining games.
