LOCAL RECORD.

HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY.—At Oakville Thursday afternoon, Prof. Lake, of the horticultural department of the agricultural college at Corvallis, delivered an able address before a good audience on the subject of horticulture. Afterwards a horticultural society with twenty-three members was organized with the following officers: Edward Albright, president; M. Acheson and R. A. Bamford, vice presidents; Wm. Patterson, treasurer; Geo. Acheson, secretary. It was unanimously voted to declare war on the codling moth, and a united effort will be made to exterminate the pest. London purple will be used this season, this being recommended by Prof. Lake. Fruit raisers in other parts of the county should take notice.

A SCHOOL CLERK ARRESTED.—Mr. Albert Saltmarsh, school clerk of the Waterloo district, was arrested yesterday, on complaint of Thil Devine, one of the directors, and brought to Albany and arraigned before Justice Humphrey on the charge of appropriating about \$100 of the school funds, which, it is claimed he refused to turn over to his successor. The defendant waived examination and was held in \$400 bonds to await the action of grand jury. The case has caused considerable excitement around Waterloo.

LEBANON.—On last Wednesday Mr. Charlie Harmon retired from the barber shop and Messrs. Bob McClure and Ben Kirk took charge. Mr. Harmon has been in the barber business in this place for about ten years. Our city fathers deserve the thanks of the denizens and especially the nocturnal pedestrians of our town for the many new lamps at the various street corners. Gertrude Cheadle, a very promising young daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. Cheadle, died on Tuesday evening at six o'clock. —Express.

A DAY SET.—Cap. N. B. Humphrey returned from Salem this noon, and informed the DEMOCRAT that he had a hearing before Judge Boise in the case of A. H. Marshall agt. the city of Albany. The judge set April 8, at 2 o'clock p. m. at his Chambers, in Salem, as the time and place for hearing a motion to dissolve the injunction in this case. This was the earliest date in which the matter could be heard. The case will be watched with interest.

WATERLOO TOO.—We think Waterloo needs the R. R. as bad as Sodaville, as it is a much better route, and then Waterloo has struck a coal mine. The vein is about two feet thick, and no telling how thick it is further in. There is coal all along the banks of the Santiam. —Cor. Express. The DEMOCRAT has heretofore made the same suggestion. The road should go to Sodaville, and as far beyond as the company can be induced to build, right into the coal beds by all means.

5 PER CENT.—Albany will raise a bonus of \$25,000 for the Brownsville woolen mills on consideration that they remove the mills to Albany. Eugene must encourage manufacturers else the town will drop behind in the race. It would pay every holder of real estate to give 5 per cent. of its value to start manufacturing establishments. AHEAD OF TIME.—The following from the Jacksonville Times is a little too "previous," but it shows how news flies these fast times: "The Brownsville woolen mills will soon be removed to Albany, Linn county, the citizens of that enterprising town having raised a sufficient bonus to induce the removal. Waterpower from the Santiam river will be employed."

A large number from all parts of the city were present, and an evening full of sociability was passed in an enjoyable manner. Furthermore, the business of the office is rapidly increasing, on account of the great influx of strangers, and the amount of pay, \$3,100 annually, he considers insufficient for the amount of work. —Courier.

Mr. John Hanshaw, who has been residing in Portland for several years, is in Albany with a view to locating. Mr. H. is an expert machinist.

J. B. Lane, of Marion county, a brother of J. G. Blaine, of Maine, is said to be on the verge of receiving a place under the present administration.

O. P. Bewley, the Eola murderer was held to await the action of the Grand Jury at Dallas yesterday under \$2500 bonds, which were furnished. The friends of Perryman, the murdered man, are greatly dissatisfied at bonds being allowed at all.

Several of the applicants for teachers' certificates at the late quarterly examination failed entirely, and very few obtained a good percentage. The new questions provided by the state board of education were quite difficult. —Jacksonville Times.

Our account of the accident to Ben Barker in yesterday's paper was a little mixed. Here is said to be the correct version: The evening previous several boys were throwing water on each other near the Baptist Church when the wrong boys hit, resulting in Ben's getting hit with a stone.

Time changes even the landscape. In Warner Valley, a few days ago, 300 tons of hay, valued at \$1500, and owned by R. F. McConnaghy and Wm. Ross, burned. In 1874 the spot where the fire took place was surveyed as Warner Lake. Goose Lake has subsided five feet since 1869.

Albany proposes to offer a bonus of \$25,000 for the removal of the Brownsville woolen mill to that city. Salem has secured a woolen mill at \$20,000 bonus, and Albany must see that and go \$5000 better. If this rivalry between Salem and Albany continues it will equal that between St. Louis and Chicago—in fervor, if not in proportions. —Ashland Tidings.

The total production of all kinds of commercial coal last year was 138,515,744 tons, valued at \$200,534,306. Of this amount, California produced 85,000 tons, valued at \$340,000; Oregon produced 50,000 tons, valued at \$150,000; Washington territory produced 1,215,750 tons, valued at \$3,647,250; and Idaho produced 600 tons, valued at \$2700.

A Walla Walla paper gets cute and has a play on words as follows: "Emigrants and others seeking homes should take the following advice: If you should at Portland go and Sautin, be sure and take a deed or Puget lots, and then settle down in Walla Walla if you would enjoy health and prosperity."

In mentioning the presence of Mr. Chas. McClure, of La Grande, in the city a day or two ago we stated that we understood Mr. McClure was at one time a member of Buffalo Bill's Wild West show. Mr. McClure once sold some horses to Buffalo Bill, and that was the nearest he ever came to it, so we were mistaken as newspaper "sometimes" do.

While we are trying to work up a small sized boom of our own, we should not forget San Diego. In a few months \$325,000 in insurance were paid there, and the companies have all withdrawn. Busted flat, the gamblers have been burning their property to get a little money, and thus unnatural booms often terminate. Albany, though, is backed by different surroundings. We should also keep out of the gambling part.
