

LOCAL RECORD.

SAD AND SINGULAR.—Some days ago a family consisting of husband, wife and four or five children left Missouri for Salem. On the way out the husband, in his sleep, walked off the train while running at regular speed, and was bruised up so as to render him quite helpless. They came in on north bound Southern Pacific this morning. Just this side of Tangent and while the train was running 30 miles an hour the wife became insane, jumped off the speeding train, ran to a house near by and informed the inmates that they had murdered her husband and children and were now trying to murder her. The train was backed up to the house, the woman taken on to Salem. Brakesmen on the train say that no railroad man could have jumped off the train as the insane woman did without being killed.

PIG HEADED.—In speaking of the reform school the *Statesman* gets pig-headed and says: "Senator Irvine is going to useless trouble. That reform school belongs in Salem and the authorities are not going to violate the letter or spirit of the law for any locality." On the whole we subject it says: "The papers of Albany say that the woolen mill subsidy of \$25,000 will be raised in a week without much trouble, but they give no figures yet. The flouring mill being started by Mr. L. Douglas will be a credit to the city. It will have a capacity of about fifty barrels a day. Will have the roller process, the machinery all being in position but the purifier and smutter. It will contain three centrifugal reels, scapling reels, cleaner, aspirator, etc. Mr. N. A. Rogers who did the work on the Red Crown Mills, and the mills at Scio, Junction and Hillboro have the contract on this mill, which is an indication that the flour manufactured will be first-class. Mr. John Johnson, recently of Silverton, will build a mill at the site of the Bundy mill and get it to working this summer. The Democrat hopes to see Linn county cities generally come to the front and Harrisburg is now setting a good example.
