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LOCAL RECORD.

A COMPLETE BOOK (?)—A rather unreliable concern that has attracted our attention is a "Complete Pocket Business Directory of Albany, Oregon for 1889, Leo Peterson, Publisher, Portland, Or." This is the way the title reads. The ads. in the little book are all right; but the directory part, great Gutterburg, the less Albany has of such directories the better off it will be. In agricultural implements, C H Dodd & Co. are left out and S E Young included. Ammunition, only one firm is given; artists, W H Greenwood left out; Attorneys, L H Montanye and others omitted; butcher shops, Shultz Bros., omitted; F Willert is given as the only carriage and wagon maker here, and he has been dead several years; two dressmakers only are given. Only four general merchandise stores are given, one being L Gottlieb. Four painters are given, George Young and A J Fox being among the number. Harry Noel is given among the saloon-keepers, etc. Among the names in the book are W H Irvine, D E Young, R C Vurk, J O W Nitsman, W W Krowder, etc., which explain themselves to residents here. The idea of the book is very good and is gotten up well enough; but men coming from out of the city to do such work should secure the assistance of some one familiar with the city, or else not receive any of its patronage, for such affairs as this do more harm than good if half done. A newspaper put up with a rush is bound to have errors, but so many in a book is inexcusable, and our citizens should keep their eyes open when solicited to support the thousand and one such schemes that are introduced. First ascertain if the man knows what he is about.

FROM ACROSS THE MTS.—Mr. David McLeod has just returned to Salem from Eastern Oregon, where he purchased three thousand wethers. He stated to a Statesman reporter that there was no grass across the mountains and said: "Some sheep men assured me they will be down soon in the Willamette valley and buy farms. The majority of them want to sell their flocks. Stock raising extensively is played out in Eastern Oregon—the bunch grass is gone forever. I came home Saturday night by the Lebanon road over the Cascades and met with four feet of snow on the summit from the head of Cash creek to Big lake; two feet of snow on the Sand mountain; no snow at Fish lake, nor on the seven-mile hill. Deer is plenty at Fish lake; they came up early from the desert and may be counted by the hundred."

CROOK COUNTY.—No news yet of the appointment of a Nashy to succeed Postmaster Moore. The department ought to act in this matter, for Mr M is tired of serving under a republican administration, besides there are others who want the office. The grass on the range is getting excellent, and now it is in order for sheep owners in Wasco and Sherman counties to drive their flocks over here and eat our ranchers out of house and home. The legislature has said they shall not be denied this boon, so the sooner they eat us out the sooner our agony will be over.—Review.

TO WATER CONSUMERS.—There is considerable complaint coming to me that water is running to waste in different parts of the city. Now, to save trouble, I would suggest that such leaks be stopped immediately, and as well a great waste from several water closets which are left running.
