On the eve of the 19th inst., a school meeting was held, and by almost an unanimous vote it was decided to build a new school house, costing \$5000, to be located in the gap between Mr. J. M. Moyer's and Mr. W. Cochran's land, just above Main street, in the western part of town.... The all absorbing topic here the past week has been the removal of the woolen mills to Albany. The necessary \$25,000 bonus has been subscribed in Albany, and all that remains now is to arrange matters in regard to the water power from Mr. Crawford, who is now absent in California, but is expected home daily. Should the woolen mills be moved from this city it will be a serious loss to us all; but there is strong talk of a home company taking hold, buying them and keeping them here. A new project is also on foot here to enlarge the present tannery and put up a boot and shoe manufactory and go into business on quite an extensive scale by using home capital.—Cor. Oregonian.

A HORSE THIEF.—Clackamas county has been having a tough time with a horse thief whose name is not known. A posse of men went after him and Tuesday night came up with him near Fairview, Multnomah county. As he showed fight they fired at him and brought him to time a dead horse thief. He was killed in the following desperate manner: "He was tracked to a grove of trees near Fairview station by means of the peculiar foot prints he made, his feet being wrapped up in gunnysacks. Between 11 and 12 o'clock Tuesday night he stepped out from his wooded retreat and discharged his pistol in the air, remaining on the spot long enough to locate his pursuers, when he fired his revolver at three of them, who were concealed in the corner of a fence near by, but failed to hit his mark. The posse in front of him then advanced and the desperado retreated up the railroad track without being aware that another party of pursuers were right in the rear of him. The attacked party opened fire upon him, and he returned it till a ball passed through his right thigh and several buck shot into his face and neck. Feeling that his wounds were fatal, he fired his last charge in the air, crying out, 'Good by, John,' and fell dead."

WHEAT.—According to the report of the statistician of the agricultural department there were produced in this country during 1888, 415,868,000 bushels of wheat, of which California raised 28,415,000 bushels, Oregon, 14,548,000 bushels, Nevada 206,000 bushels, Arizona 370,000 bushels, and Idaho 1,252,000 bushels. In the home consumption of the Pacific Coast states and territories was as follows: California, 7,112,750 bushels; Oregon, 5,091,800 bushels; Nevada, 160,000 bushels; Arizona, 92,000 bushels, and Idaho, 788,700 bushels. California shipped 21,338,250 bushels, Oregon shipped, 9,456,200 bushels, Nevada shipped 40,000 bushels, Arizona shipped 60,000 bushels and Idaho shipped 463,240.
