LOCAL RECORD.

ONECO.—The most prominent figure in the parade of stallions to-day was Oneco, owned by McKnight Bros., of this city. Nature has given to him a high form, and grand individuality, while high upon the scroll of fame is illuminated figures, so brilliant with the light reflected from his own illustrious deeds that even he who runs can read, is written 2:29 1/4, and yet this does not express all, as he has only made his debut on the turf, and even by the mouths of his enemies never was charged with any but unflinching do or die courage.

The breeders of Linn county are to be congratulated on having access to this grand stallion, as well as the county at large on being the home of this noble horse. That he will be liberally patronized is beyond question, for, every year the fascinating business of breeding the trotter is more and more engrossing the attention of thoughtful men of high social and business position and the DEMOCRAT hopes to see with the future development of our county every farmer drive a team from Oneco.

CORVALLIS HORSE SHOW.—The stallion parade which took place here on Wednesday was not very extensive, only twelve horses appearing on the grounds. These twelve, however, were very excellent specimens of horse flesh, especially the runner Glenbrook, and the trotters, Altago and Oneco. The former is owned by G. G. Glenn, of Salem, and the latter two by McKnight Bros., of Albany.—*Gazette.*

W. U. T. RATES.—Rates to points in the East have been reduced, making the maximum rate from Oregon to Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Kansas, Iowa and Nebraska 75 cents, night and day rates to those points the same. The rate for some time past has been \$1. This reduction is in line with the practice of this company for several years. Ten years ago the rate for these messages was \$2.50.

LEBANON.—Dr. Frank Metcalf, who has been attending medical lectures in St. Louis the past winter, is in Lebanon visiting his sister, Mrs. Barum. He has bought two lots in the Ralston addition, and proposes, like a sensible fellow, to make Lebanon his future home.
