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LOCAL RECORD.

A GLORIOUS COUNTRY.—The following from the New York Sun is peculiarly a Linn county item, and we are entitled to most of the credit: "What a glorious country we have! What abounding resources we enjoy. Here are the dispatches from Oregon about the opening up of new timber ranges in the Cascade mountains. We are told that the Cascades, which have been opened up by a new railroad, are covered with magnificent forests of cedar, larch, fir, myrtle, laurel, oak, ash, sugar pine, cabinet maple and other valuable trees and are ready for all uses known to the arts, and that constitute a variety of lumber surpassing that found in any other part of the United States, even Michigan, Maine or Georgia. We are also told that mineral belts and coal mines have been discovered in the same region, and that the fertile farming lands but await the hand of industry to give abundant crops of cereals. We are disposed to believe these wonderful reports from Oregon. All that the state needs for the development of its resources is population. It can sustain twenty millions of people besides the half million of people now living there."

THE BIG HORSE.—Yesterday several hundred people inspected the big horse in the tent near the DEMOCRAT office, and everybody was pleased at the sight, for the horse is really a marvel of greatness. It should be remembered that his height is not sideways; but he is as well proportioned as a race horse, 6 feet 10 inches tall, weighing 2760 pounds. He is thirty-four inches across the back, his body is the right length for his size and his feet are in proportion; yet the four shoes weigh thirty-two pounds. Among the visitors yesterday were Mr. Race and about ten ladies and children from the St. Charles, some of the ladies getting on the animal's back in order to see how it seemed to be on such a large horse. To-morrow will be the last day in this city, and our citizens should not fail to see this large horse. It will pay women and children as well as men to see him. 10 cents is a remarkably cheap admission.

TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.

THURSDAY EVENING.

Large attendance of teachers and citizens. Exercises were opened by a song by the college Choral society, rendered with fine effect.

President Stanley, of the Monmouth school, delivered an address full of good thoughts on what we live for or the pleasures of life.

Misses Belle and Amelia Senders were heard in a piano duet, performed in an accomplished manner.

Prof. Arnold, of Corvallis, was down on the program, but in his absence Prof. Hull, of the Agricultural college, presented a chalk exercise. It was nearly as good as Nast's pencil business and quite as laughable. The Prof. is quite cute in his manipulation of chalk.

Two little Brownsville girls sang a duet, "Rock a bye Baby" in a very happy manner and were heartily cheered.

Prof. Hull followed with a reading entitled: "Examination of teachers fifty years ago," which was quite as ludicrous as his chalk exercise. The Prof. makes a good Higgins.

A song by the college Choral society closed the evening's exercises.

FRIDAY MORNING.

The Institute was called to order by Supt. Curl.

Prof. R. M. Brown read a paper on "Circumstances that make a teacher happy in school." No teacher can be happy in school that does not love his profession. Pupils working industriously in school makes the teacher happy. Constant improvement in study and deportment on the part of the pupil makes the teacher happy. The happiest circumstance for the teacher is when he sees that he has implanted in the mind of his pupils a desire for knowledge.

Prof. G. F. Russell, of Halsey public schools, presented the subject of "Morality in the public schools." The speaker believes in the adage, that "as is the teacher, so is the school." A moral teacher will have a school dominated by moral influence. A teacher who feels that he cannot make a moral impression should not teach. One of the greatest evils in school is cigarette smoking. The office of teaching is the most honorable and responsible in society. Morality and ability make the true teacher. The subject was then discussed at great length, especially the evil tendency of cigarette smoking, by Prof. Walker, Geddes, Boyer, Hunt, Hickman and others, when the following resolution was adopted by a rising vote:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this institute that the law prohibiting the sale of tobacco and cigarettes to boys under the age of 18 years is a just and proper one and meets our hearty approval, and we call upon every good citizen of the state to lend his influence to its enforcement.

The institute was then treated with music led by Prof. Boyer.

Prof. W. N. Hull, of Corvallis Agricultural College, presented "The value of graphic illustration in teaching."

FRIDAY AFTERNOON.

The institute was called to order by Supt. Curl.

Prof. Hull continued the subject of "Value of graphic illustration in teaching" by the formation of a class of teachers used to represent the method of teaching drawing. He also showed how physiology may be taught by the aid of drawing.

Prof. Guiss read a paper on the subject of "Supplementary work in common schools." It was replete with many new thoughts. The subject was discussed at length by Mrs. Thrall, Mr. Curl and others.
