LOCAL RECORD.

UNRELIABLE FIGURES.—There are about 100,000 school children in Oregon between the ages of 4 and 20 according to the census recently taken. According to the way the cities are figuring out big populations this would make one for Oregon of 500,000, whereas the number is about 300,000. The same allowance should be made for cities. Salem for instance figured out 10,000, whereas 6,000 would be high. Some curious figures may be seen in Cram's last Atlas, which gives the population of every city, village and county in the United States. A peculiar instance is noticeable. It gives the population of Pierce county at 3,600, or about that and that of Tacoma, which is located in it at 9,000, and the population of Seattle is considerably more than that of King's county. Estimating populations is very unreliable business.

THE MASONIC TEMPLE.—Mr D C Scheel has prepared the plans for the new Masonic hall to be built this summer at the former site of the First National bank. It will be a handsome building 40 x 100 feet. The lower story has already been spoken for by Fortmiller & Irving for their furniture store, while the second story will make the largest and probably finest hall in the city. A town clock will be placed on top of the building, making an additional attraction and a much needed institution on the street. The old buildings are being moved and work will be begun as soon as possible.

THEY MUST GO.—The tramp family might as well make up their mind to leave Albany alone, for Marshal Hoffman is after them in earnest. Five of them got off the train this morning, and were ordered forward, but not leaving the city, at noon the Marshal used an argument that was irresistible and they departed up the track towards Portland. One of them is named "Hunchy" and a gentleman who has seen him through California says he is one of worst professional tramps and beggars on the Coast.

YACQUINA BAY.—Mr Spencer was received the first of the week as agent at Yaquina and went to San Francisco on the Willamette Valley. Mr Stewart is again acting as agent for the O P company. If the railroad arrangements reported on foot two daily trains each way and a low round trip rate from Portland are carried out, the people of Yaquina bay can make calculation on a big influx of strangers this season, and arrangements should be made in time to accommodate them.—Republican.

DRAYAGE RATES.—Drayage rates are probably as reasonable in Albany as in any city in the state, being less than in many places. Following are the prevailing rates here: Hauling sand, dirt, etc., \$1 per load; lumber, \$1 per load; household furniture, 50 cents per hour; freight, 50 cents per ton, trucks, etc., 25 cents. These rates in plain printed figures are tacked on all the ways of the city.

WHAT IT MEANS.—A correspondent writes as follows: "Will you or some one else tell us what this sort of language means and where it originated, we heard a high-toned gentleman use it. ton to Baker, be 8 ft wide, that an ordinance
be introduced to the effect.

cross walks was referred.

Petitions of Fannie Hammer and Fred
Grimmer for sidewalk were read and re-
ferred.

Councilman Gradwohl moved that ordi-
nance be passed providing that blocks Fer-
ry to Lyon streets, north side Second
street, be placed within fire limits.

Alley in rear of John Schmeier's stables
ordered graded within thirty days.
