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LOCAL RECORD.

AN EXCURSION.—Mr W C Tweedale returned last evening from Corvallis where he made satisfactory arrangements for a train of three cars for a grand O F excursion to the O P front, mention of which has been heretofore made. It will occur on the 26th instant, and will be participated in by the Odd Fellows of neighboring cities. The train will leave Albany at about 8 o'clock, go to Galesville, and return leaving there at about 4 o'clock. This is a trip many have been desiring to make, and it is doubtful if three cars will hold the crowd.

ITS PULSE ALL RIGHT.—Good for Roseburg, it now has, says a local paper, in course of construction at least 15 new buildings including to residences, one warehouse and two elegant brick stores, besides several buildings just completed and numerous others which will be begun soon, also a woolen mill ready for operations, a building and loan association with a capital stock of \$100,000; a water company with a capital \$20,000 and several other business enterprises organized all within the past few months. That is not a boom; but it is what makes a good city.

ESTABLISHED A PROGRAM.—The doctors at Ashland are evidently getting independent. COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.
