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LOCAL RECORD.

REV. HARRIS.—Rev J W Harris, of this city, who has been seriously ill for some time past, and whose various stages of sickness have been noted in these columns from time to time, is possessed of a most peculiar whim. He utterly refuses to eat or drink anything in which he considers there is food nourishment. It is now over a week since he has taken anything more substantial than a cup of coffee without cream. His excuse is that he thinks his time has come and he desires to "die in the harness," without in any manner interfering with his passing away. He lies there peacefully, sleeps a good deal and does not suffer much bodily pain, but the utmost coaxing of his wife and attending physician has no effect in persuading him to partake of nourishment. If disease is such that his permanent recovery is not expected, but the fact that he is thoroughly rational in every other respect makes his illness in regard to eating exceedingly remarkable. He takes medicine, but not if it has the appearance of having food qualities. —Statesman.

NOT A TRUE BILL.—Our item in reference to the indictment of Sheriff Smallman and Deputy Sheriff Smith by the U S Court was based on the Oregonian's item on the subject. We are glad to know it proved untrue. They were given an impartial examination, and this morning the grand jury returned "not a true bill," the news of which was received with general satisfaction by our citizens. The case was one that should never have been taken before the U S grand jury, not being justified at all by the circumstances of it.

ANOTHER BIG SUIT.—Searle & Deane have commenced suit in the United States circuit court against the Oregon Pacific Railroad company to recover the sum of \$11,293.62 with interest from January 15, 1889, and costs and disbursements. They allege a contract to build fourteen miles of railroad for which they were to receive according to the terms of the contract \$203,457.50, only \$92,652.12 of which has been paid, leaving \$111,293.62 due. It looks as if the Oregon Pacific had its share of suits; but the road will continue eastward all the same.

THIRTY YEARS AGO.—An old miner in the city, who says he did the Santiam mines thirty years ago, went to California, mined extensively there and got knocked out of \$30,000 by the law forbidding the obstructing of the streams of the state.
