NOT AS BAD AS HE LOOKED.—Speaking about ministers, said W. E. Harris, agent of the Royce & Lansing Musical Comedy Co., to a reporter the other day, "reminds me of an amusing incident which happened to Mr. Royce, our comedian, while spending the Sabbath in a Missouri town last fall. You know Mr. Royce is noted for his ministerial look. Well, he and a friend attended service at one of the churches of the place occupying a front pew. After church, the minister who had noticed the well known comedian's presence, hastened from the pulpit to welcome the stranger, and after being introduced, extended his hand with the remark 'A brother minister, I believe?' 'No,' said Mr. Royce, putting on one of his quaint expressions, 'I am not as bad as I look. I am an actor.'"

IT VANISHED.—A farm laborer came to Albany a few days ago with \$50 in cash which he had saved by hard work. This morning he appeared without a cent. He hadn't invested it in town lots or deposited it in the banks; but had left it in the saloons for safe keeping. \$50 will buy groceries for two average families a month; but one man gets rid of it in a day or two, not in whiskey alone; but in as bad as high way robbery. Besides getting his money his watch also disappeared, just how the man did not know, as he was too drunk to discover the manner of its disappearance.

A POOR WAY.—Prineville carries off the palm. Here it is, as stated by the *News*: "Little Jimmy Mahan, a lad of about eleven summers, was tried before Recorder Bell on Wednesday on a charge of writing obscene language on one of the out-houses on the school grounds. After hearing the testimony, the recorder fined the boy \$25, in default of which he was placed in jail." A MIRACULOUS ESCAPE.—"The California express train came tearing along from the north on its usual time," says the *Statesman*, "and on crossing Chemeketa street struck a wagon which was endeavoring to cross the track, breaking the wagon in two, sending the horses and front wheels tumbling eastward, while the hind wheels and the driver were sent careening in an opposite direction. The driver was a boy about 17 years old, named Henry Mann, who resides a mile or so east of the asylum. He was somewhat bruised around the hips and body, and was badly stunned when picked up, but managed to walk home behind the horses, which were also badly skinned on the hind legs, but apparently otherwise uninjured, although they, too, were terribly muddled intellectually when they recovered their feet, and ran against a fence, not knowing where they were going. The boy had not been watching matters very close, which was the cause of the accident."

BIG BEND COUNTRY.

WATERVILLE, W. T., April 8th, 1889.

Editors Democrat:

Thinking a few lines from this section of country might be interesting to some of your many readers I take the liberty of writing this. As some of your readers may want to know just where Waterville is, I would say to them get a map of Washington Territory, place your finger on the center of it, just inside the bend the Columbia River makes at that point and you are square in Douglas county and not far from Waterville. The town is on Sec. 21, Tp. 25 N, R. 22 E. Willamette meridian. We are 75 miles from Ellensburg and 120 miles from Davenport. This is a prairie country, the closest timber being on Badger mountain about 4 miles south of here. Plenty of good water is obtained at 12 to 25 feet. Everything is pretty high here on account of the long distance from railroad; but we expect to have that remedied within the next eight months by the advent of the S. L. & E. R. R., which is now building from Davenport. Waterville has had a most marvelous growth during the last year. There have been built, since I came here last Thanksgiving day, not less than sixty new dwelling and business houses. There have also been four additions to the original town site, two of 80 acres each and two of 40 acres each. We had the finest winter weather here I ever saw anywhere, although it was cold I did not wear my overcoat more than a half dozen times all winter. Nearly all the farming country within 10 or 12 miles has been "taken up" but there is still a good deal vacant further out. The spring is not quite as early as it is in the Willamette Valley but a great deal earlier than Eastern States of this latitude. Farmers are mostly done putting in their spring crops. Grass is big enough for good pasturage, and in town the gardens are "looming up" in good shape. I might go on and write enough to fill a whole page of your valuable paper, but think I have said enough for this time.
