LOCAL RECORD.

BRIDGES.—Linn county is evidently going to have its hands completely full of bridge building according to the present outlook. There is the Jefferson bridge, which will be, if built, 395 feet long with a Marion county approach of 75 feet and a Linn county approach of 400 feet. The height of bridge from bottom of river would be about 42 feet. The Marion county viewers estimate the cost at \$10,000, which is too small. The Stayton bridge would be 243 feet from bank to bank, requiring a bridge 675 feet long, located at the present ferry and it is estimated would cost \$20,000. Linn county would only have to pay half of the cost of these bridges. Then there is the Waterloo bridge, for which there has been a demand for fifteen years. The bridge would not cost a very great sum and is needed badly by the people of the vicinity, where fells one of the finest water powers to be found anywhere. All will eventually be built; but it is safe to say Linn county will not spend the whole of \$20,000 or \$25,000 the present year in building them. What will be the result.

FOR CITY HUNTERS.—The Silverton paper makes the following point in reference to the game law: "Our farmers complain that the law protecting grouse and pheasants, which expires July 15th each year, gives them no opportunity to hunt, as harvest keeps them too busy from a month to six weeks during the best season. Their grain fattens the birds, and the city sportsmen come out and bag all of the game. It is a fact, that a Portland sportsman club controls all legislation in regard to the times and seasons of bird hunting, and that is one reason why the law is not better observed in the country." At the same time it would be cruel to kill the birds earlier, during the breeding season.

A JEWEL.—A gentleman of Peik Co., boasts of having the best wife in the State says an Ex. He says that in the ten years he has been married she has never asked him for a dollar. He never gave her a dress, \$5, nor anything. He generally borrows money from her, and she makes more than he does, yet he is a merchant. She sells all home products, such as meat, lard, chickens, wood, hay, etc., and beats his store. He does not buy anything but sugar, coffee and a little rice, as he has everything else to sell off the place. He says she is above all price to him. That isn't what most men want a wife for, to support them, and few do much bragging of that kind.

PLANS BEING DRAWN.—Mr J P Galbraith, Secretary of the Brownsville Woolen Mill Company, is in the city, and will make Albany his headquarters in a short time. Plans for the mill are being drawn, and it will be modern in its makeup. New and improved machinery will be ordered and the mill will be one that will do first-class work. The machinery now in the city was not transferred to the new company, as reported, and besides the Albany mill will get some of the present machinery in the Brownsville mill.

NO BONES BROKEN.

A Man Escapes From the Jail and Falls From the O. P. Trestle.

Early this morning a man was discovered lying in a small stream of water under the O. P. trestle near the west end. At that place the trestle is about twenty-two feet high. The man had fallen from it the evening before and lain in the cold and wet during the night. Marshal Hoffman was notified, and with Dr. Maston and E. E. Parker's one horse dray started after the victim of the accident. In the mean time H M Kelley, residing near the place, put the man in a wagon and brought him to the Russ House, where Dr Wallace was sent for and attended him, the Marshal and party missing Mr Kelley on their trip. The man was recognized as John Ericson, who was incarcerated in the County jail for assaulting J H Rainey a few weeks ago with an upholsterer's needle. It was then learned that on Sunday while the Sheriff was attending to the other prisoners, Ericson had in some manner, just how cannot be learned, slipped from the jail and was "feeling over the trestle from the city when he fell where found. He had fixed his bed as if he were in it sleeping, and it was supposed at supper time he was there all right, his supper being left on a plate for him when he awakened. No bones were broken and he will be taken back to the jail. Ericson came from Costa Rica here and seems to be a weak minded, crazy sort of a fellow who had been in the habit of drinking a great deal.
