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LOCAL RECORD.

DEATH OF D. P. PORTER.—D. P. Porter, one of the pioneer settlers of Linn county, and who since 1853, has resided near Shedd's died suddenly yesterday afternoon at Portland where he has been for several days doing duty as a juror in the United States court. Mr. Porter was born in Washington county, Ohio, in 1827, where he resided until he reached his majority, when he caught the spirit of western adventure and went to Iowa. He remained there but one winter, and then, in 1852, he crossed the plains with an ox team. He settled near Salem where he taught school and the next year he moved to Linn county and took a donation claim upon which he resided to the time of his death. In 1857 he was united in marriage to Miss Parthena J. Haley, daughter of Judge Haley. He was the father of nine children, eight of whom, we believe are still living, three being boys and five girls. Mr. Porter was a highly respected citizen, one whose daily walk was a worthy example to the young. The bereaved parents and children have the sympathy of all who know them. We were not able to learn the cause of the sudden death.

ALBANY NEEDS IT.—Yesterday Mr. John Crawford, proprietor of the Albany Water Works, and Mr. Brown, the paper mill man, went up the ditch to the Santiam. Mr. Brown was very much pleased with the outlook, being favorably impressed with Albany as a location for a paper mill. He will remain in the city several days, and then leave for the East on the way to Scotland. Mr. Brown is now connected with a large mill near San Jose; but wishes to locate in Oregon. Albany possesses all the necessary advantages for a paper mill and it is hoped arrangements may be made for inducing Mr. Brown to come to Albany with his mill. We need one in our business, and the city's superior transportation facilities give it an advantage enjoyed by few places for such an institute.

A CONTRACT.—A gardener residing across the river from Corvallis brought to Albany to-day some cauliflowers that would boom any country. Our grocery men took all they could get, and soon in front of Wallace, Thompson & Co's was one measuring nearly five feet around the solid head labeled "Oregon," and another one beside it, a small, sickly looking fellow, labeled "California." They told their own story. A Californian who saw it did not appreciate the joke. The fact is, Linn county can and should raise all its own vegetables.

ITS COURSE.—Col Eckelson and his company of surveyors are now at Pickett Island on the Derchutes river, and have again resumed railroad survey work. Very little more preliminary work will be done before the permanent line of the Oregon Pacific through this county will be established. In a recent conversation with Col Eckelson, he almost assured us that the course of the road through this county would be southeastward from Pickett Island across the juniper desert and through the mountain pass west of Bear creek hills. —Prineville News.

LIKES OREGON BEST.—Hon T J Black, of Haley, has just returned from a visit to his old home at Gooderick, Canada, and stopped off yesterday in Salem. Mr. Black says this is the first time in twenty years that he has seen his old home in Canada, and reports having had most enjoyable visit and pleasant trip, but like all true Western men, he loves the hills and valleys of his Oregon home best of all. —Statesman.

BOY BURGLARS.—A couple of small boys aged ten and eleven broke into a Chinaman's house at McCoy and stole about \$10, and started on foot to leave the country. They were captured at Ballston and brought back home. They had spent very little of the money, and as it was returned to the grieving pig tail, he was satisfied to let it go without prosecuting the young culprits. —Journal.

A PIONEER OF '45.

Near Oakville, on April 24, John McCoy died, in the seventy-fifth year of his age. Mr. McCoy was born in Tyler Co, Virginia, on the 18th of July, 1814. He spent several years of his boyhood in Greene Co, Ohio, and with his parents emigrated to Warren county, Illinois, in 1831. He served in the Black Hawk war in the company of which Abraham Lincoln was captain. He acquired a good common school education in Ohio and learned the trade of a carpenter in Illinois. He was married in 1835 to Miss Sara Junkin and three little boys, started for Oregon in the spring of 1845. They were several months on the weary trip, and Mr. McCoy assisted in building a boat at The Dalles, in November, to bring his family and others to the Cascades. They arrived at Oregon City in December and spent the winter on the Taallan Plains near the present site of Forest Grove. Mr. McCoy took up his claim in 1846 and has resided on it ever since.

He was elected one of the first judges of Linn county under the provisional government in 1848, when the county was organized. He was afterward appointed to the same position when the territory was organized by Governor Lane, and as one of the county judges, selected the present site of Albany as the county seat and built the first court house in 1852. Mr. McCoy was not only a man of public spirit shown in improving the county in public buildings, bridges, etc., but was foremost in the support of education and religion. Largely through his influence his neighborhood had one of the first and best schools in the county. And in the same neighborhood is one of the largest and finest church buildings in the county. Williamette Congregation of the United Presbyterian church was organized on the 9th of July, 1850, with nine members. John McCoy was then elected one of the presiding elders and has held that position ever since.

He was a farmer of more than ordinary enterprise, always up with the times in having the latest improved machinery, the finest variety of fruits, grains and stock. His qualities as a neighbor won him many friends, and his well known hospitality and Christian charity secured him a high place in the esteem of all who knew him. He was always ready to help those in need to the extent of his ability, and in the famine year of 1852 he sold and gave away his large crop of grain so that he had to buy again in the spring of 1853. He leaves five sons and one daughter, who is the wife of F M French, of this city.

His funeral will be conducted in Oakville church to-morrow at 2 p. m., by his pastor, Rev A M Acheson and Dr. Irvine.
