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LOCAL RECORD.

DEATH OF THURSTON DAVIDSON.—Thurston Davidson, a long time resident of Linn county, died suddenly Thursday night April 25th at his residence near Shedd's. Mr. Davidson had been in his usual health up to a day or so before his death. On Thursday evening at about 4 o'clock he became suddenly ill with cramping, when the family physician was called in. The appliances in such cases seemed to relieve him and he went to sleep. Shortly after the family were called to the room by the moaning of the sufferer, when it was found he was having a severe chill. Remedies were used, but when the chill subsided he was found to be unconscious and remained so until his death. He leaves a wife and two children who have the sympathy of a host of friends. Mr. Davidson was an honest, upright citizen, respected by all who knew him.

THEY FORGED IT.—Salem, with its other metropolitan tricks, is having its hands full of forgeries lately. Here is the latest, as told by the Journal: "Monday evening Willis Jordan and Jack Morgan arrived in Salem from near Eola, where they had been working for Benj Hayden, Sr. No sooner had they arrived than they proceeded to the clothing store of G. W. Johnson, where they began to lay in quite a nice little supply of clothing. This they paid for by an order on Mr. Johnson, signed by their employer, Benj Hayden. Suspicion was aroused and inquiries made, when the order was discovered to be a forgery. Yesterday morning Marshal Ross and Sgt. Hayden, having learned that the boys had made for Alsea, started in pursuit of them, armed with a warrant. The boys were found as expected over on the Alsea and at noon the officer returned with them to the city."

A BIG HOTEL.—A joint stock company is being formed in this city for the purpose of erecting a large brick hotel, either on Broadbald or Ferry Streets, and probably not further east. It is to be three or four stories high, with stores on the ground floor, and it is proposed to make it one of the finest in the valley. The cost will be \$50,000 to \$75,000. The exact location will be settled on by the directors of the corporation when elected. A prominent citizen interested in the project gives us these particulars, and says it is certainly a fact.

HEAD OF NAVIGATION.—In its big ad, Corvallis claimed to be the head of navigation. In a communication to the Oregonian a Peoria gentleman knocks the stool out from under the statement as follows: "For the benefit of those who don't know the facts in the case, I want to state that boats are now running and have been more or less all winter up to this place, and very often as far up as Harrisburg and farther. Any captain, who is acquainted with the river channel, claims that there is a better channel between Corvallis and Peoria than there is in many places below Corvallis." The fact is the price of wheat is always as high at Peoria as at Corvallis.

DELIRIUM TREMENS.

H. B. Morgan Dies in this City after a Delirium Tremens.

About four weeks ago H. B. Morgan came to Albany and put up at the Waverly house. He reported as coming from Frankfort, Dakota, where he had been in the furnishing goods business, and which he wished to go into here. He was a man of good address and looked as if he had seen good days. On Tuesday he was taken with the delirium tremens as narrated at the time in the DEMOCRAT, and that night became exposed. Having a severe cold in the first place he gradually grew worse, and last night at nine o'clock died of congestion of the lungs, brought on by the delirium tremens. A coroner's jury called before George Humphrey, Esq., to-day found in accordance with these facts. From different sources it is learned that Morgan was a married man about 35 years of age, and had been one of the prominent citizens of the place where he came from, and that he was a member of the Masonic and O. F. lodges. Strong drink caused the trouble and he closed his business and came west, being intoxicated when he left home. While here he received about \$50 in money from his wife, with whom he had practically parted, and she refused in a letter received to send any more money, telling him that they must take care of themselves hereafter. Mr. Denham, the wire works man, who knew his situation in Dakota, says his wife's people are wealthy and leading citizens in their Dakota home. The case is a sad one. The result is the outcome of strong drink. According to the testimony of Mr. Hale Back onto Morgan bought a great deal of liquor of him, taking home a bottle near every night, finally getting trusted and running in debt over \$50. A despatch received by Marshal Hoffman from Mrs. Morgan this noon read as follows: "Hold body. Will wire to-morrow final disposition." It is thought the body will be ordered expressed home.

He was all sunshine and energy, as bright as the day, and his loss is one to the family that cannot be estimated in this world's values.
