

LOCAL RECORD.

TIMELY.—Speaking of George Washington as President of the United States was observed in Albany in a quiet way, characteristic of the inauguration itself, an event surrounded by very little of the glitter of the present day. First street, particularly the west end, blazed with flags, and flag poles over the city were all used. Business houses were all open except the banks. At 10:30 o'clock a good audience gathered at the opera house, where the program, as published by the DEMOCRAT, was carried out. Rev. Fisher, Humphrey, Condit, Trumbull, Cokmann, Rogers, Prichard and Webb taking part in prayer, scripture and hymn reading. The sermon was delivered by Dr. Irvine, a lofty, patriotic effort, full of noble thought as well as historical narration, a tribute to the memory of a man whose name becomes more illustrious as the years advance.

This afternoon was the school children's time to celebrate, and they did it in a gay manner. About three hundred at 1:30 dressed in their brightest costumes, headed by martial music and Uncle Sam in the person of Frank Blodgett, marched through First and other streets to the opera house. They carried banners with pictures of Washington, Jackson, Lincoln, Grant, and others and presented a fine appearance. The opera house was literally packed, many being driven away. Fine weather added to the gala day appearance of things.

Prof. Walker called the audience together and the children sang America. Rev. Webb offered prayer and Prof. Walker then delivered an elaborate and thoughtful address on patriotism in the schools. Miss Nettie Bassett recited very nicely, "The Character of Washington." "Our Flag" was sung by the children in rooms No. 1 and 2. "Uncle Sam's Overseers" by the boys a pretty thing.
