The Chinese Minister escorted Secretary Blaine out to the banquet table at the dinner given by the former the other night. This looks as if the Chinese needn't go before the next Presidential election, at least.

Mr John W Mason has demonstrated that he is a capable office holder from the republican point of view. He has been Commissioner of Internal Revenue just about five weeks, but in that time has managed to remove every democrat in his bureau, from Chief of the Division down to laborer.

Secretary Blaine's present attack of lumbago is the first he has had to endure since he left Europe. Before he left this country he suffered a great deal from rheumatism in the back, but he has been free from that affliction for a great many months. There is only one mode of treatment which gives him relief. He goes to bed, perspires freely, drinks hot gin and sleeps as much as possible. It generally takes him about two days to fully recover when the attack has been a sharp one.

Among the "paradoxes of science" Blackwood's Magazine mentions the fact that water, which will allay thirst, augments it when congealed into snow; so that it is stated by Arctic explorers that the natives prefer enduring the utmost extremity of thirst rather than attempt to remove it by eating snow. Yet if the snow is melted, it becomes drinkable water, while ice, which melts more slowly than snow in the mouth, is very efficient in allaying thirst.

The farmers of Minnesota are threatened with another grasshopper pestilence. The scourge has appeared in Otter county, and the state authorities have set about wiping it out as was done last year. The first thing done will be to plow the land wherever the eggs are found. It is estimated that there are about 5000 acres on the Perham prairie which will require this treatment.

M Ungerer, a French scientist, believes that flowers and the perfumes distilled from them have a salutary influence on the constitution, and, indeed, may be regarded as a therapeutic agency of high value. He says that residence in a perfumed atmosphere forms a protection from pulmonary affections and arrests the development of phthisis. He adds that in the town of La Grasse, where the making of perfumes is largely carried on, phthisis is rare, thanks to the odoriferous vapors exhaled from the many distilleries.

Sir Henry Thompson, one of the most celebrated English physicians, takes very advanced grounds on the subject of the eating habits of modern life. He says that from facts coming constantly before him he is obliged to accept the conclusion that more mischief in the form of actual disease and of impaired vigor and shortened life accrues to civilized man from erroneous habits in eating than from the habitual use of alcoholic drinks, considerable as he freely acknowledges that evil to be. Indeed, he declares it to be his conviction that more than one-half of the diseases of the meridian and latter part of life among the middle and upper classes of society are due to easily avoidable errors in diet. He points with emphasis to the fallacy of the generally accepted idea that the growing stoutness of middle life is due to vigor or an index of healthful conditions. The typical man of eighty or ninety years, still retaining a respectable amount of energy of body and mind, is lean and spare, and lives on slender rations.

An extraordinary fallacy is the dread of night air. What air can be breathe at night but night air? The choice is between pure night air from without and foul air from within. Most people prefer the latter, an unaccountable choice. What will they say if it is proved to be true that fully one-half of all the diseases we suffer from are occasioned by people sleeping with their windows shut? An open window, most nights in the year, can never hurt any one. In great cities night air is often the best and purest to be had in twenty-four hours. I could better understand shutting the windows in town during the day than during the night, for the sake of the sick. The absence of smoke, the quiet, all tend to make night the best time for airing the patient. One of our highest medical authorities on consumption and climate has told me that the air of London is never so good as after 10 o'clock at night. Always air your room, then, from the outside air, if possible. Windows are made to open, doors are made to shut, a truth which seems extremely difficult of apprehension. Every room must be aired from without, every passage from within.
