LOCAL RECORD.

THIRTY-ONE DAYS WITHOUT FOOD.—The condition of Rev J W Harris continues virtually unchanged, save that he is growing weaker from day to day. It is now thirty-one days since he has partaken of food, and then he ate but two ounces of some light diet. Until two weeks ago, he took a little coffee each day, but since that time his only sustenance has been warm water. He is conscious of his condition, and realizes that as the days succeed each other, his end is approaching.—Salem Journal.

ANOTHER MINE.—Charles Hayes who lives upon Cow creek in Lane county is in the city to-day says the Salem Journal and from him it is learned of a rich discovery of gold mines upon the Cow creek. These mines promise to yield in paying quantities. The mine lies about 84 miles south of Eugene, and the people of that section of the country are said to be wild over the discovery. He has at present about 28 tons of ore on the dump and has reached a depth of 38 feet in the shaft up to the present.
