The Texas umbrella tree is becoming a favorite for shade and ornament purposes in California. It is a large and beautiful tree, resembling an umbrella in the spread of its foliage, which is so dense that it affords perfect protection from either rain or sun.

Postmaster General Wanamaker broke the record last week in rapid changing of postmasters. The total number of Republicans who received post offices last week was 1,016.

In advertising his spring stock of dry goods Postmaster-General Wanamaker combines piety with a shrewd regard for his pocket book. A Philadelphia newspaper contained the following Wanamaker advertisement a few days ago: "Easter is five days away, but its cheer and brightness have dawned all over the store. In the basement, on the main floor, on the second and third floors you can see the brightening light of the glad season. The merchandise seems to have caught the inspiration of the time." We begin to suspect that the great contributor to the republican corruption fund in the last campaign is very much of a pious humbug.

The German emperor seems to be imbued with the most Spartan notions of parental discipline. The crown prince, aged 6, and his next brother, Eltel Frederick, aged 5, have only an hour and a half's recreation during the day. Every day the hapless heir gets up at 6 and begins his studies at 7, he is drilled daily alone, and afterward goes through military exercises with his brothers. "The result of this system of all work and no play is likely, I should think," says Labouchere, "to be that the children will turn out either prigs of the first water or imbeciles. If there were such a thing in Germany as a society for the protection of children I should strongly advise it to institute a prosecution against the emperor for wanton cruelty."

The East Oregonian, replying to the scurrilous attack made by the Oregonian recently on Samuel J. Tilden, very justly says: "That Tilden was in any sense a partner or sharer with Tweed in his colossal stealings is as base a slander as was ever uttered by an utterly unprincipled sheet against the memory of a noble soul. If the Oregonian had been the 'leading newspaper' in New York during the Tweed regime, as it is in Portland to-day, Tweed would have had no more faithful ally or obedient servant—as long as he divided liberally. That paper has a natural—or an acquired—love for just such operators as Tweed; and it never can forgive Tilden for two things: one is for exposing Tweed and his associate rascals, and the other is for being an honest democrat. There is a gang as utterly dishonest, unscrupulous, thieving and rascally—though necessarily on a smaller scale—in Portland now as Tweed's was in New York, and the Oregonian is well aware of this fact, but it is their ally, friend and counselor."

THE HEIGHT OF OCEAN WAVES.

A writer in the Liverpool Mercury—a captain of the mercantile marine—has taken great pains to take what are probably the most careful observations as to the height of ocean waves in a gale which have ever been recorded. He made them during a voyage round Cape Horn and to do it he went up in the main rigging to get, if possible, the top of the wave coming up astern in a line of sight from the mast to the horizon at the back. The reason he selected the mainmast was this, that as a rule it is nearly amidships and when the sea is running the sea ahead and from aft lifts the two ends, forming a hollow amidships, (the actual foot of the wave below the mean draught equal to the sight elevation,) and the observer necessarily is above the true height. It was a difficult operation, but the captain obtained some good observations, making the height of the waves on the mast. On measuring the distance from these to the main draught he found them to be as follows: 64.61, 55 and 65 feet respectively, varying in length from 750 to 800 feet.
