The Blaines have been having a hard time of late. Some months ago Walker Blaine broke his leg. Then his father's attack of lumbago came on, and now James G. Blaine, jr., is at the Normandie, Washington, suffering from an abscess under the arm.

At the civil service examination held in Roseburg this week there were but three applicants examined, H. V. Smith, of Douglas, and T. J. Wilson, of Lane, were examined for places as mail agents on the railroads, and C. Herman, of Coos county, for a treasury clerkship.

President Harrison has appointed his brother, Carter B. Harrison, to be U. S. Marshal, for the middle district of Tennessee. This is said to be the first time a president ever appointed a brother to an office. There is much less dignity in counseling with a bribe-giver like Dudley than this appointment of his brother.

We cannot afford to bind 75 cent wheat with 20 cent twine, says the Rural World. The formation of trusts can be made unprofitable if the people organize and co-operate for self protection. Without such organization, "Trusts" and "Combinations" will fatten and grow strong on the helplessness and ever increasing poverty of those who refuse to help each other. The state grange meets on May 29th at Salem. The Master says: "It is well known to the people of the state that we, the agriculturists, are capable of attending to affairs pertaining to our interests, and that we demand representation and are going to see that we are represented in the councils to the state and nation in a ratio commensurate with the interests we represent."

Casual notice of the timber land filings in various papers, says the Astorian, shows that a large portion of the applications to purchase timber land are made by women. A woman, married or single, over eighteen years of age, has the same rights in the matter that a man has, and can make application and secure 160 acres the same as a man. The only provision is that it must be with her own money. But that can be easily arranged.

Our farmers are beginning to be distressed about granary and storage room for the phenomenal crop now coming on. The yield of wheat bids fair to be fully 50 per cent greater than ever before known, for the favorable farming weather last January and February tempted farmers to put in every available bit of ground, and the crop is now looking unusually well.—Ex.

It is a matter observed by nearly everybody that the protected wool manufacturers are not rushing over and trampling each other down in their mad rush to secure a chance to give a better price for wool than that which ruled last year, when Cleveland's tariff reform message was said by these same manufacturers to have ruined the wool market. We trust that democrats who had wool in their teeth and over their eyes last year will be "restored to light and liberty."

And now it is said that "Bro Ben," as Dudley familiarly calls the president, has relented and called upon the latter to come and visit him at the White House. This Dudley is the bribe-giver and originator of the "blocks-of-five" scheme by which Harrison was elected, and he is to be consulted as to the policy to be adopted in administering this government for sixty millions of people. Think of this, you who are so wont to extol the virtue and dignity of the present powers that be.

GOING BACK.

If there is one thing more certain than another, it is the fact that there is a large number of republican leaders who are preparing to desert the negro, and break the relationship of paternal care which that party has so long professed to entertain for that class. The attitude of President Harrison in refusing to appoint any of the leaders of that race to office shows the feelings that is taking possession of that party. But now comes ex-Governor Alcorn of Mississippi, a republican of long standing, and speaking of the President's efforts and scheme to build up a white republican party in the South, says: "I wish him success but he will not be able to build up a white party in the South. It is born and bred essentially democratic, and cannot be changed from without. The republican party missed its opportunity at the close of the war and in succeeding years. If it had chosen a wise policy then it would have divided the South. If Grant had sustained me at the time of my election there would have been a white republican party which would have held the state. The Southern people will not have negro rule. The negro is not a white man with a black skin. He is a different race. He is a barbarian, and barbarians cannot rule a civilized people. His head is covered with wool. He is a sheep, the white man has straight hair like a lion. The negro is an infant, and it will take centuries of development to thoroughly fit him for civilization." Such sentiments expressed by a democrat would at once subject him to the charge of being a secessionist and rebel.

The Pittsburg Post says: President Harrison is having the guillotine worked as it never has been by any of his predecessors. Some qualms are reported, but they are fictitious. Twelve hundred removals and appointments a week by Clarkson tell the story of the postal service, while Democratic Union veterans are being removed in crowds from the Pension Office. Nor is this all. The example at Washington is reviving some of the worst abuses of Grantism. Offices are in the market since the President announced he would permit Republican Congressmen or Republican candidates for Congress to control the patronage in their respective districts.

It is to be hoped that the state authorities of Louisiana will vigorously punish the mob that rode into a town in that state and prevented the negroes from voting at a municipal election.
