THE WOOLEN MILLS.—The following rather contemptible and unkind remark comes from the Salem Statesman, and only confirms what the DEMOCRAT has heretofore said of that city's jealousy of Albany: "Not being able to rob Brownsville of her woolen mills, Albany has cast about for other prospects, and now proposes to import a woolen mill from the East. It is understood the Kankakee Woolen Mill Co. of Kankakee, Illinois, has been enquiring in regard to the inducements offered for the removal of their plant to that place. * * Albany is not careful that she will be over run with woolen mills, there already being one at that place almost ready to commence operations." Albany never tried to rob Brownsville of its woolen mill. The proprietors of it wished to locate at Albany and our citizens were glad to offer them inducements to do so. No robbery in that, any more than there was when Salem got Mr Kay away from Brownsville. Keep the handle on your jug.

THE N. G.—On Sunday last W Mackay, the official representative of the Scotch liquidators of the Oregonian (narrow gauge) railroad, was in Newport and made a thorough examination of the government works and the charts of Yaquina Bay and bar. It will be remembered that this harbor is one of the terminal points specified in the charter of the Oregonian railway. We understand that the gentlemen who now have control of the affairs of this corporation have under consideration the building of a line from Ray's landing, through Clackamas county, to East Portland, about 35 miles in length and the extension of the west side road from Arlie to Newport.—Yaquina Republican.

HOW'S BUSINESS.

The business being done by the leading stores of a city is a good indication of the prosperity of a city, and is more valuable to a city than the reputation of a boom that is full of uncertainties. Albany's present growth is just such as suits the best element of its business men. It is reliable without excitement. Too much boom is like a game of poker and injures more than it helps the business of merchants. A DEMOCRAT man has talked with a number of the merchants of Albany, and they generally pronounce trade as on a rapid increase. One says his sales show a decided increase over last year, another fifty per cent larger, both old merchants with large lists of customers, another, three times as large as last year and others a flattering gain. One man tells us that he has not lost \$25 from bad debts since in business, and many state that cash sales are good and credit growing less. The business outlook in Albany was never as good and the fact speaks louder than bluster for the city. Besides the mercantile business, the hotels are crowded, the restaurants have full tables, the drays and delivery wagons are pushed, it may not be pleasant to contemplate but the saloons are making money, etc. Better still the churches are fuller and the pastors better supported than formerly. Albany is becoming more of a city in many respects.

TEMPERANCE COLUMN.

Edited by Albany W. C. T. U.

As an especial favor to the managers of the Centennial hall, the New York Senate passed a bill allowing the authorities of New York City to grant special licenses for the sale of liquor at balls still five o'clock in the morning, instead of closing at one o'clock as required by the general law.

The report of the collections of internal revenue in the United States for the first eight months of the fiscal year ending June, 1888, shows that there has been an increase in distilled liquors over the corresponding months of last year, of \$2,508,317.21 and in fermented liquors of \$6,137,284. None of this increase, however, comes from the two prohibition states, Iowa and Kansas. In Iowa there has been a decrease of \$59,868.20 in distilled liquors, and in fermented liquors \$37,999.21.

In Kansas there has not been a single dollar collected on either distilled or fermented liquors.

In local option Georgia, however, there has been an increase of \$43,489.55 on distilled liquors, and of \$1,793.93 on fermented liquors.

Thus the internal revenue report is another testimony that prohibition is the most effective method of dealing with the liquor question.

The figures that were furnished through the kindness of Commissioner Mason, also showed that not a dollar had been collected during the present year on stills and worms in either Iowa or Kansas.—Union Signal.

Oakland, Ind., a small town ten miles from Indianapolis, has had a revival of the Crusade. Kepler's place, a saloon there, did so much injury that the mothers of the village decided it must be closed. They watched the place, secured the names of men visiting it, and had them brought before the Grand Jury to testify to the proprietor's selling liquor in violation of law.

In squads of four or five they went into the saloon and sat there near the bar, until relieved by the next squad. They recorded every drink sold with the name of the purchaser. Efforts were made to intimidate the plucky women, but in vain. The result is several indictments against the saloon keeper, and the closing of his place.

SODAVILLE.

The season is opening fine for Sodaville. The hotels are filling up and letters of inquiry for rooms are coming in from all directions.

Wm Terhune has purchased Dennis Klum's livery stable, and has put in new buggies, carriage and hacks.

The daily hack will meet the one o'clock train at Lebanon after next week.

The camp meeting commences May 30, and will continue through June. Extensive preparations have been made for a successful meeting. There will be speakers from Chicago, Washington territory will be well represented.

There have been petitions circulated and signed extensively throughout the county for a bridge across the south fork of the Santiam at Waterloo. The people have been trying for about twelve or fourteen years to secure a bridge at that place, and are now rejoicing to learn that one is to be built. There are hundreds of people living on either side of the river that have to go four miles up or five miles down the river to get across, making an extra drive of eight or ten miles, except a few weeks in the summer, and then an empty wagon at the cross below Waterloo is all a team can cross with and climb the hill, hence it will be a great thing for the community. The bridge will afford the people living in the forks of the Santiam and the public generally, direct communication with the mountain wagon road, the road to Crawfordville, Sodaville, Brownsville and the prairie generally, through the famous gaps of Richardson, Happy Home and Ritter, on a direct line from Seio to Waterloo. The site for the bridge is the safest and most secure on the river, having a solid rock foundation on either side.
